"PAY AS YOU GO."—The present financial pressure which we are about emerging from has no doubt been a severe lesson to those persons who have heretofore undervalued this well tried maxim. What a terrible thing it must be to a man continually "over head and heels" in debt, as the saying is. It is far better, and in fact necessary for a successful business career, to conduct all business dealings upon a cash basis, both in buying and selling. If young business men, and old ones, too, would only learn the importance of dealing upon the cash system there would be less failures to record during the period of a stagnated trade.

PAY FOR YOUR PAPER.—Too many are apt to think that it matters but little whether a newspaper is paid for promptly or not, "tis such a small sum that it is but of a little consequence. An exchange makes the following appropriate remarks in relation to the matter. It speaks the sentiment of the press generally, when it says: Unless the cash system is exclusively adopted and readily observed, we know of no business whose bills are so difficult to collect. This is not because the subscribers are unwilling to pay, but it is principally owing to neglect. Each one imagines that because his own indebtedness amounts to so small a sum the printer cannot be much in want of it, without for a moment thinking that the fruits of his entire business are made up of exactly such little sums and that the aggregate of all subscribers is by no means an inconsiderable amount of money, and without which the publishers could not continue to issue their paper.
