PEACE PROPOSITIONS. The following correspondence was forwarded as part of the telegraphic dispatches one day last week.

Buffalo, July 21. (PRIVATE AND CONFIDENTIAL.) CLIFFORD HOWES, NIAGARA FALLS, July 18, 1864.

Dear Sir - I am authorized to say that Hon. Clement C. Clay, of Adams, Prof. James B. Holcomb, of Virginia, and Mr. S. Saunders, of Dixie, are ready and willing to go at once to Washington.

Mr. Holcomb presents his compliments to Major Hay, and greatly regrets if his return to Washington has been delayed by any expectation of an answer to the communication which Mr. Holcomb received from him yesterday.

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Had the representatives of the two Governments met to consider this question the most momentous ever submitted to human statesmanship.

Col. W. C. Jewett, Cataract House, Niagara Falls, N. Y. We are in receipt of your note advising us of the departure of Hon. H. Greely from the falls.

It is enough for us to say that we have no use for the paper which has been placed in our hands. We could not transmit it to the President of the Confederate States.

The following is a copy of the original letter held by me to deliver to Hon. H. Greely, and which duplicate I now furnish to the Associated Press.

Sir - The paper handed to Mr. Holcomb yesterday in your presence by Major Hay, A. G., and which was received by me in our note of the 18th inst., is couched in the following terms:

Any proposition which embraces the restoration of peace, the integrity of the whole Union and the abandonment of slavery, and which comes by and with an authority that can control the armies now at war against the United States, will be received and considered by the Executive Government.

Major Hay would respectfully inquire whether Professor Holcomb and the gentlemen associated with him desire to see Washington to Major Hay, any messages in reference to the communication delivered to him on yesterday, and in that case when he may expect to be favored with such message.
