## The Late Emperor Napoleon.

Charles Louis Napoleon Benaparte, or Na-poleon III., was born at the Tuileries, Paris, April 20, 1808. He was consequently seven years old when his uncle, the great Napoleon, returned from Elba. When the Benaparte family were banished from France after the battle of Waterloo, Louis and his mother first battle of Waterloo, Louis and his mother first went to Augsburg, and thence to Switz rland. The republic made the youth a c. Izen, and allowed him to serve in her arm. He studied gunnery at the military academy on Lak-Thus. While making pedestrian excursions among the Alps, news reached him of the revolution of 1830. He wrote to Louis Philippe, the new king of France, asking permission to serve me a private soldier in the army. His petition was answered by the renewal of the defree of banishment. Young Napoleon and his brother then went to kisly, where they took part in the insurrection of Rome. The elder brother died at Moril, March 17, 1831, and Louis then went secretly through France petition was answered by the renewal of the defree of bankshmet. One of these, his Artiflery Manual, has considerable merit. The Duke dying, Louis was the Napoleonic heir. In 1836, Prince Napoleon made his lamons mitempt to capture the fortress of Strasburg, which miserably failed. He was taken prisoner, and kept there from October 20, to November 9, when he was removed to Paris. His life was spared on condition of emigrating to the United States, whither he was taken under protest. He soon returned to Switzerland, where he The French Government demanded the banlabment of Prince Louis from Switzerland,
and backed its demand with the movement of

an army to the frontier. The Prince retired from Thurgau to London, where, in 1839, he published his "Napoleonic Idens," his most notable book. In 1840, he hired the steamer Oty of Edinburg, and, with Count Montholon, Gen. Voish and fifty three others, embark d for Boulogne. Only one soldier deserted the garrison for the camp of the invaders. Prince Louis was captured, tried and sentenced to perpetual inprisonment in the eastle of Ham. He made his escape in the dress of a work-He made his escape in the dress of a work-man, May 26, 1846, after an incarceration of man, May 29, 1849, after an incorrectation of six years. He crossed the frontier into Belgium, and for the third time made his way to England. The events of 1848 paved the way to his fortune. Returning to France, he was at first elected a member of the National Assembly. Subsequently he was eleted President of the France Republic. He made use dent of the French Republic. He made use of his position to revive the recollections of Napoleon's glorious rule. Receiving advice of the intentions of the National Assembly to take measures against his growing power, he arrested its leaders and distolved the body. He proclaimed himself dictator, and a large majority of the French people ratified the itmsjority of the French people ratified the nilegal act. A year afterwards, the nation voted
him Emperor by a majority of six millions.
He was proclaimed Dec. 2, 1852, under the
title of "Napoleon III., Emperor of the
French, by the grace of God and the will of
the people." The prominent events of his
reign, the Crimean (was, the conflict with
Austria in Italy, the annexation of Savoy, the disastrous Franco-Prussian war, etc., are to o tresh in the memory to need recounting here.

The success of Louis Napoleon as ruler of the French, the material development of the country during the earlier years of his reign, the preservation of order among a people prene to revolution caused many to overesti mate his ability and to forget his political crimes. His sudden downtall at Sedan caused many to exaggerate his faults and to overlook his sincere desire to promote the prosperity of France. It would be impossible to give an adequate estimate of his character in the space Frenchmen that the Emperor and his cousin Jerome were one day in familiar conversation, when the former said: "My dear cousin, of all Canaille, you are the trankest;" to which the latter replied: "My Imperial cousin, of all Ca-noille, you are least frank." Reticent, believ-ing in his destiny, strong in will, unscrupulous, no. wanting in intellect, endeared to the French people by the great name he bore, his reign marked, and was the principal cause of, a transition in a great civilized nation from traitional glory to materialistic sordidness, from the remeniscent chivalry of the reactionary Bourbons to the degeneracy that made the descendants of the revolutionists an easy pr y to the disciplined Germans. Louis Napoleon died in exile, and is doubtless the last of his dynasty. France will return to her proud


