France - We are happy to have it in our power to say, that the difficulties which have so long disturbed the friendly relations of the United States and France, may now be considered as at an end.

United States Bank - This institution has received a charter from the Legislature of Pennsylvania, now in session; and will, in future, transact its business as a state institution.

Legislation - The Bill to prohibit the circulation in this State of bank notes of a less denomination than five dollars, has passed the lower house of the Legislature by a vote of 28, yeas 28, nays 28.

THE BOUNDARY. We learn by letters from Washington, under date of the 13th inst., that a vote has been taken at a meeting of the Judiciary Committee, of the House of Representatives, which decides the principles on which that committee will base their report touching the Northern Boundary of this State. The vote alluded to, was decisive of the question whether Congress, in fixing the boundary, of the three original States, comprehended within the northwestern territory, ceded by Virginia to the United States, had the right to extend the limits of those States north of the due East and West line, claimed by Michigan, as unilaterally secured to her by the ordinance of 1787, as her southern boundary.

We have given to-day a preference in our columns to the Report of the Senate Committee (of which Mr.

Ewing, of Ohio, is the Chairman) on Mr. Clay's Bill for disposing of the Lands. The Bill is set for discussion to-morrow; and as the Report may be considered as embodying, in the most exact form, the arguments in favor of the Bill, the publication of the Report will put our readers in possession of the whole ground covered by the proposition.

It is satisfactory to remark that the present moment is most favorable for a dispassionate and unbiased decision upon the Bill which is the subject of this report. We have just got clear of one argument which fatally threatened every proposition for improvement of the internal condition of the country. We can no longer refuse the proposed distribution of the surplus revenue, on the ground that it is wanted for a French war!

The whole amount comprised in the Bill may be distributed as proposed, and enough money to yet left in the Treasury for all proper uses and purposes of the General Government.
