FLAG OF THE UNION.—On and after the 4th of July next, the flag of the United States will be spangled with twenty-six stars, two being added in consequence of the admission of the States of Arkansas and Michigan into the Union. In 1818, the number of States then being twenty, an act was passed "that on the admission of every new State into the Union, one star be added to the Union of the Flag; and that such addition shall take effect on the 4th day of July then succeeding such admission." The thirteen stripes, denoting the thirteen original States, were on the admission of Vermont and Kentucky, increased to fifteen; but as the number of States was further enlarged, it was perceived that the flag would not, eventually, admit of a stripe for each, and so an act was passed fixing the number at thirteen, as before. The last star added to the flag was on the 4th of July, 1822, in honor of the State of Missouri, which was admitted into the Union on the 10th of August, 1821. The star for Maine was added on the 4th of July 1820.

### BILL TO REGULATE THE PUBLIC DEPOSITES.

The following is an abstract of the bill which has passed the Senate and is now pending in the House of Representatives. It comprises 15 sections

Sec. 1st, makes it the Treasury Secretary's duty to select such of the state banks as may be most convenient to the places at which the revenues are collected or disbursed, and be considered by him safe depositories; and in Territories or places where no banks exist or can be so employed, he is authorized to make arrangements with any banks elsewhere, to establish an agency for the public business under the same liabilities as the deposite banks. "Provided that at least one such bank shall be selected in each state,"—upon the terms hereinafter prescribed; that he shall not suffer to remain in any bank, an amount more than equal to three fourths of its capital stock actually paid in, for a longer time than is necessary to make the transfers required in the 12th section.

Sec. 2 provides that in cases where no safe bank can be regularly employed, he shall direct the collections to be deposited in some adjacent bank, upon the terms hereinafter prescribed, "Provided that Congress shall have power to remove the depositories and change the terms, and the banks may at any time decline the service upon paying over the money.

Sec. 3. No bank be employed until it furnishes a statement of its condition and business, list of directors, price of stock, copy of charter, and other information necessary to enable the secretary to judge of its condition.

Sec. 4. The banks must before being employed, agree to the following terms:

1. To furnish weekly or monthly statements, as the secretary shall require, of its condition and business and weekly statements to the treasurer, of the public account, and the secretary shall have the right to inspect such account in the books, without, however, the privilege of inspecting any private accounts.
- 2d. To credit all sums deposited as specie, and to pay all drafts in specie if required by the holder.
- 3d. To give all necessary facilities to the Secretary for transferring the public funds from place to place, with out commissions or difference of exchange.
- 4th. To render the government all the services heretofore required of the United States Bank.

Sec. 5. No bank which does not redeem its notes with specie, and none which issues notes under \$5 to be employed; nor shall the notes of any bank which issues smaller bills be received.

Sec. 6. The Secretary may require collateral security from the banks, and

Sec. 7. authorizes him to contract with banks under this act.  
Sec. 8. No bank, employed, shall be discontinued or the money drawn therefrom unless it shall fail to comply with the terms, or to keep such an amount of specie as he shall require

in order to render it a safe depository, having due regard to the nature of its business; and all withdrawals to be reported to Congress as early as possible. In default of any bank to receive them, the depositories withdrawn to remain in the treasury.

Sec. 9 The present deposite banks to be employed as heretofore, until the Secretary shall have effected the object of this bill.

Sec. 10. The Secretary to make a full report annually to Congress.

Sec. 11. The banks to pay 2 per cent interest whenever the deposites shall, for a whole quarter, exceed one fourth of their capital paid in, for the use of the excess; the interest to be calculated, for each quarter, upon the average excess of the quarter.

Sec. 12. forbids all transfers of public funds to accommodate the banks and sustain their credit, or for any purpose except to facilitate the public disbursements; and in cases where transfers shall be required for purposes of equalization under this act, in consequence of too great an accumulation in any bank, such transfers to be made to the nearest deposite bank, "Provided, that the President may direct transfers to the mint for coinage.

Sec. 13. The money in the Treasury January 1837, reserving the sum of 5 millions shall be deposited with the several States, in proportion to their respective representation in the Senate and House of Representatives

—the Secretary to deliver to such persons as the states may authorize to receive it, on receiving certificates of deposite by the competent state authorities, for such amount and in such form as the secretary may prescribe, which shall express the obligations of the State to pay the amount to the United States on their assigns. The Secretary is also authorized to sell these certificates whenever there is a want of means to meet appropriations; all sales however, to be ratable, and in just proportions according to the amounts received by the States respectively, all certificates sold to bear 5 per cent interest from the time of the sale, and to be redeemable at the pleasure of the State.

Sec. 14. The deposites to be made with the States as follows—one quarter part, 1st January, 1837, or soon after as may be; one quarter, 1st April; another July 1st, and the other, October 1st of the same year.

Sec. 15 With a view to the additional duties of this act, the Secretary is authorized to appoint three additional clerks for his department; the first with \$1600 salary and the other two \$1000

The above bill has passed the House by a vote of 155 to 28. In the Senate yeas 40 to 6.

### LATEST FROM MEXICO.

NEW ORLEANS, June 4.  
The schooner Amelia arrived on Tuesday last, in ten days from Vera Cruz. Capt. V. states that the news of the Capture of Santa Ana was not known there at the time of his sailing; although the authorities of Vera Cruz were in the daily receipt of intelligence from the army. Captain Ashby, of the schooner Cumanche, arrived last evening from Matamoras, which place she left on the 26th ult., states that the news of Santa Ana's capture had reached that place, but had caused very little sensation; all remained perfectly quiet. The prisoners, who were under sentence of death, had been released, and numbers of Mexican troops were arriving daily in Matamoras, on their way back from the scene of warfare, with the determination not to return to Texas again.
