#### UNFORTUNATE AFFAIR.

On Saturday last a man named Hennis a resident of Elkran township lost his life under afflicting circumstances. He had been to town in the fore part of the day and became considerably intoxicated, as is said to have frequently been the case with him. When he returned home, he went to the meadow of Seth McClure, where there were a number of hands at work making the hay which Hennis had previously mowed for a stipulated sum. He told Mr. M. that he had not received enough for cutting the grass, & at length became very abusive in his language. Mr. M. then requested him to go away as he kept his hands from work, but he remained for near an hour. At length he so far provoked Mr. M. that he told him he must go, or something like it, about the same time striking him with the handle of his fork on the side of his head. Hennis then started towards his house, but before he reached it, fell. Upon examination it was ascertained that his skull was broken and that he could not survive. These are the reports mostly in circulation. Hennis died on the next day.

Mr. McClure has always sustained the character of a worthy man in this county and has been a resident for many years; but in an unguarded moment he struck the man a blow, who was doubtless abusing him, which resulted in the loss of his life. For this act he has expressed much sorrow and regret.—He left the place, it is said, sometime on Monday evening.—*N. Lisbon Aurora.*

We have very recently published an account of certain hostilities said to have taken place between Indians and Whites on our Northwestern frontier. The Missouri Republican of the 5th instant, received yesterday, furnishes the following key to this new alarm of Indian hostilities, which it appears in this case, as in so many others, were a mere brawl, owing its origin to the depravity and brutality of white men.—*Nat. Intelligencer.*

"We have been informed by a gentleman who was within thirty miles of the scene of this affair, that it originated in a drunken frolic at a grocery kept by one of the white men. There were several white men and several Indians at the grocery.—They got drunk, fought, and two of the whites were reinforced and one Indian was killed. We had these particulars from a gentleman who came from the immediate neighborhood."

It is announced abroad that the Royal Society of Northern Antiquaries, at Copenhagen, are about publishing by subscription a work which is to throw new light upon the discovery of America; it will be entitled "Antiquities Americanae," or collection of the accounts extant in Icelandic and other Scandinavian manuscripts relative to voyages of discovery to North America, made by the Scandinavians in the 10th and following centuries. It is declared that it will comprise testimony, the most authentic and irrefragable, that North America was actually discovered by the Northmen towards the close of the 10th century, visited by them repeatedly during the 11th and 12th, (some of them even making settlements as colonists,) re-discovered towards the close of the 13th, and again repeatedly resorted to in the course of the 14th. It is said, moreover that what serves in no small degree to enhance the value of these documents is the great apparent probability, amounting indeed almost to certainty, that it was a knowledge of these facts that prompted the ever-memorable expedition of Columbus himself! We give this report as it reaches us in a Paris paper, and look eagerly for further information. *National Gazette.*

**Scientific Expedition.**—An appropriation was made by congress, during the last session for a voyage of exploration to the Pacific Ocean, and South Sea. The President has accordingly given orders that the vessels be fitted out without delay. The frigate Macedonian, is undergoing thorough repair for this purpose and will be accompanied by two briggs of two hundred tons each and one or two tenders. Captain Thomas Ap C. Jones will take the command of the expedition and J. N. Reynolds, Esq. has been appointed corresponding Secretary. We hope the enterprise may be honorable to all concerned.—*Visitor.*

Among the most interesting of the assemblies which the present Age of Conventions has witnessed, few, if any, have been more interesting than that which met at Knoxville, in Tennessee, on the 4th of this month, (and at our latest dates was yet in session,) to take measures for the construction of a Railroad from the Southern to the Western country. At the first meeting, Col. JOHN WILLIAMS, of Tennessee, being called to the chair, and Parrot LEA appointed Secretary, the Delegates were called over, and there were present the imposing number of three hundred and fifty, of whom 78 were from South Carolina, 53 from Kentucky, the same number from Georgia, 112 from Tennessee, 28 from North Carolina, 11 from Virginia, 6 from Alabama, 2 from Ohio, and 2 from Indiana. Many of the most distinguished citizens of the South were present. Among them, Messrs. ROBT. Y. HAYNE and POINSETT, of S. C., Governor SWAIN, of N. C.,

Mr. Justice WAYNE and Judge CLAYTON, of Georgia.  
On motion of Mr. WICKLIFFE, of Ky., Gen. HAYNE was chosen President of the Convention.  
On the following day several other Delegates arrived from Ohio, among whom was Gen. Jos. VANCE, and one or two others from Kentucky. The Delegates were received and treated in the most hospitable manner by the People of Knoxville, all the private houses being full of guests, and the public houses overflowing.
