laws and regulations, making distinction on account of color and thus delivering Ohio from this deep disgrace.

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M. R. Robinson spoke of Dunn's bill showing the infamously character of its provisions. The bill extends the fugitive slave law over Kansas and Nebraska and authorizes the holding of slaves in the territory till 1858.

Further remarks were made by Messrs. Parker, May and others, after which the session closed. LAST SESSION—MONDAY EVENING.

PARKER PILLBURY addressed the meeting. One thing he said struck him this morning, while the Congress of the conduct of those Republicans in opposition who voted for Dunn's bill.

The exposure of the pre-slavery position of the Republican party occupied less of his time, but was nevertheless as emphatically made, as the proper limits of an evening's lecture would permit. The most undivided attention was afforded by the whole audience, of which each individual appeared to feel it a privilege to listen to the uncompromising utterance of the truth.

On Saturday the 13th and 14th, a series of meetings was held in Magadore, Summit county, which though well attended were lessened somewhat by the fact of a meeting of the Disciples church in Akron, at which was expected that father in the modern Israel, Alexander Campbell, the notorious apostle for, and advocate of Human Slavery.

The next meetings were in the afternoon and evening of the 17th at Alliance, Stark county. A grant of the brick meeting house used by the United Brethren was obtained, and the meetings advertised therein, but when the hour arrived neither the keeper of the house, nor the key to open it, could be found.
