In an opinion rendered to Secretary of State Carmi A. Thompson, Attorney General Ellis makes an interpretation of the law as to what township officers are to be elected at the municipal elections to be held this fall. He holds that successors will be elected to all justices of the peace, township trustees elected in November, 1904, and qualifying in 1905; that successors will not be chosen this fall to constables who were elected in November, 1905, for three years. The successors of these are not to be chosen until November, 1909, and will take their offices in January, 1910.

Township trustees who were elected in 1905 for three years, will serve to January, 1910; their successors being elected in November, 1909. Township trustees elected in April, 1903, and November, 1904, will have their successors elected in November, 1907, for two years each. All assessors will be elected again at the election next November.


