Judge W. W. Teegarden, candidate for re-election for second term as Common Pleas Judge of Darke county, was born on a farm in Brown township, Darke county, Ohio, in 1862. His experiences as a boy were such as usually fall to the lot of country boys. He attended the district schools during his school age, and later became a student at the Normal University at Ada, Ohio. He began teaching in the public schools in 1884 and continued in that vocation for nine years, three years of which employment was in the country schools and the remaining time in the graded schools at Assonia. In the meantime he took up the study of law under the direction of the law firm of Knox, Martz & Rupe of Greenville, and having passed a successful examination before the State Board of examiners, he was admitted to the bar in 1893; he then discontinued teaching and entered the practice of law in Greenville, continuing in the practice until 1908, when he was elected Common Pleas Judge in the second subdivision of the second Ohio District, since which time he has been engaged in the discharge of the duties incumbent upon him in that office. On December 24th, 1885, he was married to Catherine C. Hershey; as the result of the marriage there were born to them four children, Chester H., Roland E., Harold B., and Lorene, all of whom are now living.
