Mrs. Margaret Lytle, 70 years old, mother of Michael Lytle of this city and Frank Lytle of Arcanum, died Saturday evening in her home, a mile northwest of Coletown, after a lingering illness. Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the Christian church in Coletown.

Edward Schaffer, 55 years old, died at the Dayton State Hospital last Saturday night, where he was taken a few weeks ago, he having lost his reason. He resided with his family west of town, and for a number of years was a tenant on the Ries farm, south of town. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at

the U. B. church and burial made in Greenville cemetery.

Joseph Longenbaker, 54 years old, a brother of Timothy Longenbaker of this city, died in his home in Castine last Thursday morning. Funeral services were held Saturday morning at St. Mary's Catholic church in this city and burial made in Catholic cemetery, northeast of town.

Joseph Oswald, 69 years old, a former resident of this city, died on Wednesday of last week in his home at Dayton, Ohio. He leaves his wife and six children. His remains were brought to this city and funeral services held Friday afternoon at the Brethren church on Central avenue. Burial was made in Greenville cemetery.

Frank Kelley, who killed George Nibarger last fall and was acquitted of murder, was arrested Friday evening and taken before Judge Boli Saturday, where an examination showed he was a fit subject for the Hospital for Epileptics at Gallipolis, where he was committed. He has been subject to epileptic seizures for some time, the attacks of late becoming quite frequent and violent.

William Studabaker, nearly 80 years old, died at 2 o'clock Sunday morning in his home on Walnut street, after a lingering and painful illness of cancer of the face. He leaves his aged wife and one son, David Studabaker, who resides in New York. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at his late residence, Rev. Gross reading the Episcopal burial service. Burial was made in Greenville cemetery.

John A. Miller, 63 years old, who suffered a paralytic stroke a few weeks ago, died Friday morning in his home on Martin street. He came to this city some thirty odd years ago from Champaign county, Ohio, and embarked in business, but recently had been a trusted employee at the Home Store, having been with the former proprietors, Messrs. Gordon & Alter, for many years. He leaves his second wife, two sons and two daughters. His remains were taken to Urbana, Ohio, for burial, funeral services having been held at the Baptist church here Monday morning at 9 o'clock.

The hearing for the appointment of a guardian for John McNutt was again postponed last Thursday to July 2 on account of the disability of Mr. McNutt. At the hearing Thursday, however, Mrs. Nora M. Shpir handed back the deed for a 131 acre farm in Neave township that Mr. McNutt had given her, for which she was to take charge of his residence and see that he was properly taken care of in case of sickness, etc., which was the principal cause for the application for the appointment of a guardian for him being made by his children, and will no doubt prevent the introduction of a lot of testimony that was promised when the case came up for hearing. Probate Judge Boli's court room was packed by interested and curious spectators Thursday.

Deputy Clerk Ed Williams filed objections with the Board of Education last week to the petition of Charles Minnich as a candidate for member of the school

board on the grounds that same did not state whether Mr. Minnich was to run for the long or short term and that it was not properly filed as required by law. Another objection was filed by George Groshans against the candidacy of Charley Kemble for the same office, on the grounds that he (Kemble) was not a Republican, but was an avowed member of the Progressive party, and that his petition did not specify what school board he was a candidate for. At a hearing by the Board of Elections Saturday afternoon no agreement was reached, the Board standing two for and two against. Under the law the matter will now have to be submitted to the secretary of state for settlement.
