It is said that many bushels of early apples are going to waste in Darke county, and can be bought in some orchards for 25 cents a bushel. Owing to the rains many farmers have been unable to gather them, having to first look after their grain harvest.

Berman K. Smith of Arcanum was selected last Saturday as a member of the Agricultural Society to fill the vacancy caused by the death of M. L. Weisenbarger, president of the board. L. N. Reed was elected as president and George H. Worch as vice president.

Mrs. W. B. Blottman died at Williamson, W. Va., Sunday morning, aged 34 years. She was Mr. Blottman's second wife, to whom he was married about a year ago and had many friends in this city. A baby daughter was born to them about two weeks ago. Funeral services were held Wednesday at Cincinnati.

Our council voted favorably Monday night on the proposed city park in the Meeker and Garst addition and work upon it will be commenced this year. There will be about twenty acres in this plot for park purposes and is an ideal location for a recreation park.

County Clerk Ed Shafer, on Monday morning, entered upon his second term, with a clean and good record, having been highly commended by the State Bureau of Uniform Accounting for the careful manner in which he has kept everything in his office. W. A. Chenoweth of Glenkarn was in the city on business Tuesday. Mr. Chenoweth returned a few days ago from a six weeks' visit in the west, including Yellowstone Stone Park, Grand Canyon and the Panama Exposition, and is highly pleased and delighted with what he saw in the western country. His party was composed of himself, his brother J. A. Chenoweth, H. R. Mikesell and John Thomas of Arcanum.

Harry Owens, 18 years old, was instantly killed about midnight last Saturday on the Big Four near Elroy. He was driving home from Ansonia in a buggy and was struck by a train just as the rig had got onto the track, smashing the buggy and the young man's body lodged on the pilot of the engine. The engineer says he saw the rig, whose occupant apparently was asleep, but he was too close to it to stop the train in time to prevent the accident. The young man was well known here and was a steady, industrious young fellow and the supposition is that he fell asleep and was not awakened by the approaching train.

Judge Bowman decided the Sharp case this week, dismissing the application of the heirs for removal of O. P. Sharp as executor of the estate of Levi Sharp. Another case decided was the granting of custody of his two children now in the Brethren Home here to the father, John Shank of Pleasant Hill, O. The John Jackson damage suit against The Ohio Electric Railway Co. for damages for injuries sustained by being struck by an electric car while running the Mozart truck at the corner of Fair and Sweitzer streets last fall, was decided by the Judge, who overruled a part of the petition and sustained part of it. In the Curtner case against the county commissioners and treasurer, enjoining them from collecting ditch tax, the demurrer of the defendants was overruled and plaintiff was given leave to plead, but the date has not yet been fixed for the latter.
