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### Gettyburg.

Mrs. C. Jervis and children of Columbus were guests of Mrs. M. J. Coburn for the greater part of last week.

A goodly number of our people attended the Chautauqua at Bradford yesterday.

C. J. Miller and family and Ed Swinger and family took a swing over the country yesterday in the former's auto, covering a considerable area of territory in their drive.

Attorney L. E. Harvey of Bradford was here today attending to a case of litigation.

On last Friday night a very large number of our village and vicinity attended a dialogue debate between Messrs. Hall and Sommers on the wet and dry issue before the voters of the state. The aggressions of the wet side were forcibly presented by the one and the apologies for it were presented by the other, and additional thereto, the well-beaten track of personal liberty, and the large fund of taxes paid by the traffic, was paraded in support of the wet side of the question. These supports were demolished and the traffic left to support itself by the large amount of good it does for the individual, the home and the state. When these were summed up they were so infinitesimally small that microscopic aids would have been necessary to discover their existence. The defender could not resist the logic of the dry arguments, and confessed his error and swung to the dry side and the debate concluded in a dry victory, the exact result that should come from the voters of the state in November.

On last Wednesday noon, when Mrs. S. Murphy went call her brother, Fred Laver, who has operated her mill near this place for several years, to dinner she found him dead in the doorway of the mill, having died there alone, it is supposed of heart failure. He was seemingly in his usual health at breakfast time and when found the appearance was that he had been reading the morning daily. He was aged about sixty-eight years. Burial was made in Harris Creek cemetery.

David Hershey, formerly a resident of this village, but for about twenty years has resided at Richmond, Ind., died there last week and his remains were given burial in our cemetery today. He was aged nearly 74 years and is survived by the wife of his youth, two sons and three daughters, all grown to manhood and womanhood, and a brother and sister.

After a short illness of blood poison, resulting from the pulling of a tooth, and some other ailments, C. O. Hahn died in his home in this village today. Mr. Hahn conducted a tonsorial parlor here and was a man of strict probity and correct personal habits. He is survived by his wife and a son and daughter, his father and mother. He was aged about 35 years. As to age, he

had a prospect of life for many years, but it was not so that long life was to be his. No telling when the Messenger of Death will appear. In the midst of life we are in death and thus it has proven in the deaths occurring here.

A new system for raising money to defray the expenses of our M. E. church has been invented to make up a deficit in the funds needful to meet the obligation of the years, and whether it will prove a success depends upon the willingness of the membership to respond to the requirement. That others may benefit by the invention it is given, as follows: That Sunday is denominated as Dollar Day, and to make it effective every member is expected to contribute one dollar in addition to the payment of their apportionment, so that if one hundred persons should each contribute \$1.00, the treasury would be increased by one hundred dollars, which would probably liquidate all liability. What may be expected from this invention? Wait and see is all we can do, but it is hoped this unique plan will meet with the favor it deserves. There is no patent on this invention and any other church can use it without fear of prosecution for infringement.

### Notice to the Public.

The undersigned, Mayor of the City of Greenville, Darke County, Ohio, and President and Secretary of the Darke County Agricultural Society, for the purpose of controlling the traffic during the time of the annual fair in said county, August 23 to 27, inclusive, and for the safety of the public, direct that the following regulations be observed:

All motor vehicles in passing to and from the fair ground will be routed from the city to the fair grounds and return as follows: Over Central avenue to Martz street, to the north gate or entrance of the fair ground, returning via Martz street and Central avenue to the city.

All other vehicles will be routed from the city over Central avenue to Fair street, to the east gate of the fair grounds, and return by same route to the city.

Police will be stationed at all proper locations for the guidance of the public. The co-operation of the public in enforcing these regulations is earnestly requested.

### Greatest Fair in Sixty Years.


The Great Darke County Fair on August 24-27 at Greenville, Ohio, promises to be in every way the most stupendous exhibition of its kind held anywhere this year.

Two big New York Hippodrome acts have been secured for free attractions and one of the very largest wild animal shows in existence will be among the pay shows.



### Ohio Dry Workers in Accord with State Sunday School Sustaining Fund
