Frank Ward, who lives on the Wildcat road, was arrested last week on a grand jury indictment charging him with fornication. He gave \$200 bond for his appearance at trial.

Grace Longfellow, who was arrested last week on a grand jury indictment charging her with conducting a disorderly house, plead guilty Thursday and Judge Bowman fined her \$158.56 and sentenced her to ninety days in the work house. The latter was suspended providing she would leave town, which she promised to do and was thereupon released.

Wm. Marker, who lives in the country, was placed under arrest last week on a charge of incest with a stepdaughter. He was indicted by the grand jury last week. He was released for trial on giving \$1200 bond.

Louise Beck was taken to the Girls' Industrial School at Delaware last Thursday by Mrs. Geo. Mace. The girl's mother was recently arrested here and taken to Piqua to answer a charge of conducting a disorderly house there.

At a social function given by Miss Lois Porterfield at her home on East Fifth street Saturday afternoon, the approaching wedding of Miss Mary Gaskill and Glen Evans was announced, to take place on Thanksgiving Day, November 25.

Father John A. Gnau of Frenchtown has been appointed by Archbishop Moeller of Cincinnati to fill the vacancy in the Catholic church here caused by the death of Father Brummer, and will take up his new charge on next Sunday.

The remains of Claude Albright, who was 34 years old, arrived here Monday from San Francisco, Cal., and were interred in Abbottsville cemetery. He was a member of the United States Marine and a son of Edward Albright of Dayton, O.

John Swarner, 60 years old, died in his home in Lima, Ohio, on Monday morning of last week, and his remains were given burial in Abbottsville cemetery on Thursday last. Mrs. Wm. Fry and Mrs. Elmer Lantz, both of this county, are daughters of the deceased.

Wm. Cassel, who has filled the Dunkard ministry for the past sixty-eight years, died last week in his home in Franklin township, at the age of 90 years. He had been an elder in the church for fifty years. Funeral services were held Sunday and burial made in the Mote cemetery.

Calvin Pearce, recently indicted for stealing a bicycle, plead guilty Monday and Judge Bowman fined him \$25 and sentenced him to thirty days in the Toledo work house. Fine and sentence were both suspended on provision that he leave the county and state at once, which he said he would do.

Frederick Strobel, nearly 22 years old, died of consumption Monday morning in the home of his parents, Charles Strobel and wife, on the Requarth pike, after an illness of about two years. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon and burial made in St. John's cemetery on the Versailles pike.

Word was received here last Friday morning that Pres. Buchanan had been seriously injured near Waynetown, Ind., by being thrown from a wagon that was crashed into by a Big Four train. He has been staying of late with his son-in-law near that town and both were in the wagon when it was struck. He was said to be injured about the head. He has two sons here, one of whom is Walter Buchanan, the confectionery man.

District Tax Assessor W. Y. Stubbs was indicted by the grand jury last week for issuing a false pay roll to the State Civil Service Commission. It is contended that he carried three clerks on his pay roll whose appointments had never been approved by the Commission. These extra clerks were Jessie Laird, Olive Nelson and Major Vance, so it is claimed.

Mrs. Mary A. Townsend, 82 years old, died on Wednesday morning of last week in her home near Jaysville. She leaves eight children—W. H. Townsend, Edward Townsend, Andrew Townsend, G. A. Townsend, Mrs. J. M. Brincy, Mrs. Harless Wright, Mrs. Elias Oswalt, and Mrs. Carrie Niswonger. Funeral services were held Friday at Abbottsville church, where burial was also made.

Mrs. Daniel Penny, 71 years old, who resided a half mile west of Laura, met death last Friday evening by accident. She started to her milk house with a granite dipper in her hand, intending to get milk for the evening meal, and her foot caught on a loose board in the walk, causing her to fall. She threw up her hands and in doing so the dipper handle extended straight up, the handle entering her nostril and penetrating the brain, causing almost instant death.

Albert Steinhilber was arrested at Richmond, Ind., last Thursday on a warrant charging him with forgery. On circus day he presented a check on the Farmer's Bank at New Madison, purporting to have been issued to Carl Norris signed by Frank Noggle and it was cashed by the Greenville National Bank, as it looked to be all right. When it reached the New Madison bank and Mr. Noggle saw it, he at once proclaimed it a forgery. Steinhilber was brought to Greenville by the officers, coming without requisition papers, and Friday afternoon he was arraigned, waived examination and was bound over to the grand jury under a \$500 bond, which he failed to give.

Mrs. Mary Emrick has filed suit against the bondsmen of ex-Probate Judge J. B. Kolp, for specific performance of contract. In the settlement that was effected a few days ago, whereby she was given possession of her Broadway business property by the court, she was to pay the bondsmen \$1000 and they were to sign a contract settling all their rights in this property. She avers in her petition that four of the bondsmen—D. W. Bowman, A. C. Robeson, Daniel Burns and D. Robeson—have done this, while the other three—T. A. Lecklider, J. P. Teegarden and W. H. Ganger—refuse to sign it, making no objection to the form of the contract, but there seems to be a difference among themselves, and the suit is brought to compel them to fulfill the contract.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF OHIO.

EXEMPTING PUBLIC BONDS FROM TAXATION.

Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Ohio:
Section 1. A proposition shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Ohio, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1916, to amend Article XII of the Constitution of the State of Ohio by the addition of Section 12, to read as follows:
JOINT RESOLUTION.

Proposing a supplement to article XII of the constitution of the state of Ohio, by the addition of a section to be designated section 12, article XII, relative to the exemption of bonds from taxation.

Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Ohio, Three-fifths of the members elected to both houses concurring therein:
That there shall be submitted to the electors of this state in the manner provided by law, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1916, a proposal to supplement article XII by an additional section to be designated section 12, article XII of the constitution of Ohio to read as follows:

Section 12. Bonds of the state of Ohio, or of any subdivision or district thereof, authorized by law to issue bonds, issued on or after January 1, 1916, shall be exempt from taxation.

Be it further resolved, That at such election above referred to this supplement shall be placed on the official ballot, in the manner provided by law and designated as follows:—**"TO EXEMPT BONDS ISSUED ON OR AFTER JANUARY 1, 1916, OF THE STATE OF OHIO, OR ANY SUB-DIVISION OR DISTRICT THEREOF, AUTHORIZED BY LAW TO ISSUE BONDS, FROM TAXATION,"** or in other language sufficiently clear to designate it. If adopted this supplement shall take effect on the first day of January, 1916.
