By planting wild trees and shrubs bearing fruits about the home, the householder can attract birds and at the same time protect cultivated fruits from their ravages.

Ladybirds have proved, under normal conditions, to be almost complete checks on the ravages of the spinach aphid and other aphids which formerly were a serious menace to the cultivation of spinach, cabbage, and various other truck crops in southeastern Virginia.

Gettysburg.
