

MEMORIAL SERVICES.



Q. U. W. lodges all over the land held memorial services last week. Saturday was the ninth anniversary of the death of John Jordan Upchurch, the founder of the order, and on Sunday the Great Bend members met at their hall at 11 o'clock and marched to the Methodist church, where memorial services were held. Rev. Schnacke delivered the sermon. The founder of this great order of Charity, Hope and Protection, John Jordan Upchurch, was born in Franklin county, North Carolina, March 26, 1822, and died at Steelville, Mo., January 18, 1887. His remains were interred in the Bellefontaine cemetery, St. Louis, and a handsome monument, the offering of the order, has been erected over his grave. Mr. Upchurch was educated in the country schools of his native state, and until 1844 clerked and farmed. In that year he married, and after having failed in trying to conduct a temperance hotel at Raleigh, he became master mechanic of the Mina Hill and Schuykill railroad. He held this for thirteen years. In 1864 his savings of a lifetime were lost in oil speculations. In 1868 he secured a position in the shops of the Atlantic & Great Western railroad at Meadville, Pa., where he organized the A. O. U. W., with a membership of fifty. Had providence spared his life until to-day he would have had the pleasure of seeing the ranks of the fifty men he banded in "Charity, Hope and Protection" swelled to 345,000.
