Josiah Tindall Dead.

Josiah Tindall died Tuesday morning at the home of his son, Walter Tindall at Hoisington, where he had made his home for the past nine years. Mr. Tindall was sick only a few days. He was 87 years, 10 months and 25 days old at the time of his death, and had been coming down town regularly until a week ago Sunday he complained some to his son that he was suffering some pain in his stomach, but was not confined to his bed until the day before he died.

He was born in Montgomery county, Tennessee, October 11, 1819, and lived there until eight years old, when his parents moved to Howard county, Mo. He left there in 1886 and came to Kansas, and until locating at Hoisington in 1900, lived at various places in the state. Mr. Tindall was married in 1842 to Miss Caroline Switzer in Howard county, Missouri, and to this union ten children were born, eight surviving the father. His wife died at Glasgow, Mo., July 5, 1882. The surviving children are Newton, Walter, Charley, and Mrs. O. H. Bowler, of Hoisington, Mrs. Fannie Williams of Kansas City, Wallace Tindall, of Pratt county, Warren Tindall of Los Angeles, Calif., and Joe Tindall of Kansas City. Mr. Tindall was a member of the L. O. O. F. lodge, but when he came to Kansas he dropped it as there was no lodge where he located. He was a member of the Baptist church and lived a Christian life.

He was of a jovial disposition and whenever he came down town was always glad to engage any one in conversation. His mind was bright and clear, even up to the time of his death.

The funeral was held at Hoisington Wednesday afternoon and was largely attended by friends of the deceased and the family.
