

**Further Talks**

Senator Foraker, of Ohio, has been talking vigorously of late. In a speech before an assembly of negro Methodist bishops he used language implying that he stood ready to bolt the Republican party in case Taft or Roosevelt were nominated for the Presidency. Speaking of Taft delegates from the South, he said: "They do not belong to my party, and I will not belong to theirs." He also spoke of the possibility of "new parties."

On the 14th inst. Senator Foraker made a speech in the Senate on the Brownsville affair, in the course of which he severely criticized President Roosevelt and defended the negro soldiers whom the president drummed out of the army in disgrace without a trial. It was a great speech and its effect on the negro vote in the states of the North and Middle West may be to defeat the Republican national ticket.

These recent utterances of Foraker show that the breach between himself and the Roosevelt faction is liable to be permanent, and that he may be expected to lead a movement at the polls against any man whom the Roosevelt faction may force upon the Republican party. In such a case Foraker would have among his followers not only most of the negroes, but many of the old Union soldiers and a large class of reactionaries. In other words, he would have within his grasp and the backbone of the old Republican party, and the fight be-

tween the old and the new republicans would be beautiful and interesting.

**TAKEN TO FEDERAL COURT.**

**Bochemoble Insurance Case Taken to Higher Court.**

The case of Mrs. Hannah Bochemoble against the United States Casualty company has been removed from the district court of Reno county to the United States District court. The defendant made a motion to this effect and the plaintiff confessed the motion to be proper and the transfer was made. This is the suit brought by Mrs. Bochemoble to recover \$10,000 insurance on the life of her husband who was killed at Ellinwood some weeks ago. It is alleged by the company that Bochemoble was a suicide, but the plaintiff's claim is that death was due to an accident. The company refuses to pay on the ground that their policies are not payable in case of suicide—Hutchinson Independent.


The total assessed value of the personal property of this city is now \$1,189,000 or about seven times the amount of last years assesment. There will be some additions to this amount.
