### About the Chinch Bugs.

The experiment station of the Kansas Agricultural college has issued bulletin or circular No. 5 dealing with the chinch bug trouble. It contains some very useful information, and can be had from the director, E. H. Webster, on application. A summary of the information contained is as follows:  
1. The chinch bugs are hibernating in bunch-grass, blue-stem, and other native grasses in pastures, mown meadows, neglected places about the farm or along roadsides of highways and railroads.  
2. If they are not destroyed by natural agencies or by farmers they will prove disastrous to cereal crops next season.  
3. It is not the part of wisdom to depend upon the "chinch bug fungus" to control the bugs.  
4. Cornstalks instead of being burned should be plowed under in the fall or early winter.  
5. As soon as the grass becomes thoroughly dry fire should be run over all pastures, meadows, roadsides and waste lands wherever blue-stem, bunch-grass or other native clump-forming grasses are found.

### The First Sales Day.

The Barton county farmers and their families are invited to be in Great Bend next Tuesday and participate in Barton county's first sales day. This is a day set aside for the farmers to buy and sell anything they wish. It gives them an opportunity to dispose of live stock at public or private sale. A law machinery, household goods or anything that they have not further use for and others may want. There will be five auctioneers on hand and a multitude of buyers.

All wishing to sell anything list it with the secretary any time prior to "putting it up" and it will take its turn according to number. The auction sale of live stock will commence at 1:30 o'clock promptly on Tuesday afternoon. Those who intend to dispose of live stock should have it listed and ready so that there will be no time wasted after the sale starts. There will be a suitable place arranged to show stock before it is put in the auction ring. Before and after the live stock sales, other goods will be put up and disposed of.

Remember that if you do not wish to buy or sell, this will be a very interesting day for you. The Great Bend merchants have also made special arrangements to profitably entertain the visitors on that day, and all the ladies should be here to help make Barton county's First Sales Day a grand one.

### City Council Meeting.

The City Council held its regular session Monday night. A large amount of business was transacted. The petition of C. J. Momyer and others asking to have Motion street opened between 7th and 9th streets was referred to improvement committee.

Petitions were granted for sidewalk on the west side of Odell street between 7th and 10th streets. One on the east side of block 63.  
One on the west side of blocks 130 and 135.

One on the east side and south side of block 43 Helzer Park addition, and along the west side of blocks 1 and 8 in Ireland's addition.  
One on the west side of block 30 in Helzer Park addition.  
One on the south side of blocks 1 and 2 A. V. T. Co. addition.

On both sides of Helzer street between 8th and 12th streets.  
The waterworks company was authorized to maintain a fire whistle at a cost to the city of \$100 per month.

The license for moving picture shows was increased from \$5 to \$10 per month.  
The total of all bills allowed at this meeting was \$1390.71.

Additional bonds for \$2000 for completing the disposal works of the sewer system were ordered issued.  
An election was called for the purpose of voting \$20,000 in bonds payable in 20 years and bearing interest at 4 1/2 per cent, for the benefit of the Kansas Northwestern Railway Company, said election to be held on the 8th day of March, 1910.

### Federal Subsidy for Road Making.

Representative D. R. Anthony, of Kansas, has evolved a new idea in regard to good roads legislation. He proposes a federal subsidy for the encouragement of good road making in the various states and as a beginning he offered an amendment in the House this week, during the consideration of the Agricultural appropriation bill, providing for an appropriation of five million dollars to be expended by the government in improving roads traveled by rural free delivery carriers. Mr. Anthony's idea is for the government to bear only one-fourth of the expense of the work on the roads, the rest of the cost being prorated between the state, county or township through which the road in each case passes. Roads utilized by the rural free delivery service would alone be subject to the provisions of any national legislation, because, under the constitution, the only power which is given congress to improve roads would be limited to post or military roads. Mr. Anthony made a vigorous speech on the floor of the house in support of his amendment, and although it went out on a point of order, many members of the House have expressed their approval of the plan and it will undoubtedly be heard from later. The feasibility of the plan was generally admitted.

### The Road Drag Law.

Chapter 197 of the session laws of Kansas for 1909 creates an individual called the "drag man." His duty is to form an intimate acquaintance with a road drag, whose manufacture is also slightly described in the same law. It is his duty to hitch this drag to a team of horses and work it up and down the highway during the year in the hope of bettering the condition of the highway.

The law, which refers to drags and drag roads, says, "And it shall be the duty of said board to see that the provisions of this act are enforced."

Here are three sections of this law:  
"Section 1. It shall be the duty of the township board, for the purpose of this act, to designate such roads as in their judgment, by reason of amount of travel and grade conditions shall be known as drag roads. They shall divide such roads into sections as will best carry out the purpose and provisions of this act. And it shall be the duty of said board to see that the provisions of this act are enforced. Beginning at a point nearest to city or town these sections shall be continuous to the extreme point dragged or to the township boundary, except where soil conditions make it impracticable to drag. Said board shall appoint a drag man for each section whose duty it shall be to drag the public highway in his section when the conditions of such highway require such work. The township board shall provide a road drag for each section which shall be shod with steel blades and not to be less than seven feet in length. Said board shall divide such roads as require, by reason of travel and grade, width more than one trip with drag. For the purpose of this act a trip shall be the dragging of the entire length of a section and return. The township board shall designate what portion of the road shall be single-trip and what part shall be double-trip road."

"Section 2. In the selection and appointment of a drag man the residents abutting their section shall have the preference; provided that township boards may remove the drag man from his position on account of ineffectual work and make another appointment for said section at any time.

"Section 3. Compensation for a single trip shall be at the rate of not to exceed fifty cents per mile, with a maximum expenditure of five dollars per mile for any one year; and for double trip roads at the rate of seventy-five cents per mile, with a maximum of seven dollars and fifty cents per mile for any one year."

This act is in force and effect. It applies to every township board. It is an inexpensive way. Many a mile of road can be made better than it is now. It is easy to improve mile after mile of highway and it is easy to decide whether or not this method will do the work.
