### Condemnation Proceedings.

On petition of the Missouri Pacific Railway Company, S. S. Shattuck, M. C. Elmore and A. H. Baker have been appointed commissioners to cause to be surveyed and to appraise and condemn for the uses of said company for additional terminal facilities at the city of Hoisington, Barton County, Kansas, for additional side tracks, depot, work shops, round house, warehouses, water stations and for the storage of materials for the construction and repair of its road the following described lands, to-wit:

A strip of land 50 feet wide in the s-e ¼ of the s-e ¼ of section 5, township 18 south, range 13 west, Barton county, Kansas, described more particularly as follows.

Beginning at a point in the east line of said section 5, 846.5 feet south of the present south line of the right-of-way of said Railway Company, extending thence west 620 feet to a point in the east line of Main street, at a point 800 feet south of the present right-of-way of said Railway, thence south 50 feet, thence east 620 feet to the east-line of said section 5, thence north 50 feet to the place of beginning, containing 71 acres more or less.

Also beginning at a point in the west line of Main street 770 feet south of the present south line of the Right-of-way of said Railway company measured along said west line of Main street, thence south 79 degrees 45 seconds west 400 feet, thence south 100 feet, thence north 79 degree 45 seconds east 400 feet to said west line of Main street, thence north 100 feet to place of beginning, containing 90 acres more or less.

Said commissioners will meet on July 5th, at 9 a. m. for the purpose of performing their duties and to hear complaints.

### The Rock Road Law Held to be Constitutional.

The Hodges Rock Road law passed by the last legislature, was declared constitutional by the Supreme court last week. State officials interested in the upbuilding of a road system in Kansas consider this decision a great victory. The action brought to test the law was from Johnson county H. A. Hill of Johnson county, protested against the levying of a tax to build the road from Olathe to Kansas City. He contended that the law granted legislative power to the petitioners for the road and that it was unconstitutional for this reason. The supreme court held that there was no merit to this contention; that the law is constitutional.

Hill owned land in the district through which the proposed rock road from Olathe toward Kansas City was to run. He brought injunction proceedings to prevent the letting of a contract for building the road. A temporary injunction was granted but on the



final hearing the temporary injunction was dissolved and the county was allowed to go ahead with the work. But Hill appealed to the Supreme court and tied up the proceedings again.

The court held that the Legislature had the right to delegate discretionary legislative powers to local boards for local government. The court said that the county commissioners had ample authority to fix the location of the road and its boundaries and the lines of the taxing district to pay for the road and to levy a tax of one-fourth the cost of the road to be spread as a general tax over the entire township through which the road runs. When the petition came in from the land owners the county commissioners were to judge whether or not the road was

a needed public utility and if so to order it built and let the contract for the work. The board could also determine how the tax was to levy and what payments were to be made each year. The court also held that the provision for a general tax over the entire township through which the road runs to pay one fourth of the cost is not in conflict with any general tax laws, limiting the tax levies in any township.
