Opera House Opening at Ellinwood.

Last Friday night at Ellinwood the Knights of Columbus opened their new opera house with grand opera. This night had been looked forward to for the past year, when Ellinwood would again have a place of amusement and an up-to-date play house. The house was opened with the LeBrun Opera Co., in Martha. There was a large crowd present on this occasion and Saturday night the same company put on Faust in opera which was also greeted by a large and appreciative audience. Seats for the two opening nights sold readily for \$2.50 per seat.

Monday night the dedication of the new dance hall took place. It was opened with a concert by the LeBrun Opera Company and at 9:30, Morris' orchestra started with one of their beautiful waltzes and the dancers tripped the light fantastic until 2 o'clock in the morning.

The new opera house is a solid brick building, three stories high

with basement. The first two floors are used for the opera house and the third floor as dance hall and lodge rooms. The basement is occupied by the Ellinwood Commercial Club.

The building is modern throughout and is said to be one of the best arranged play houses between Kansas City and Denver. It is electric lighted, with steam heat and water and sewerage connections, has rest rooms for women and children. All told, it is a building that the whole of Barton county should feel proud of. It was built by the Knights of Columbus for the benefit of the community.

The business men and citizens of Ellinwood contributed to the building fund very liberally, and they all point with pride to their new opera house.

The Big Denver Show.

Denver, Jan. 10.—Preparations for the opening of the big National Western Stock Show on next Monday, January 16, are completed and it is promised that all previous shows will be eclipsed in the Sixth Annual. This is made possible by the elegant new buildings which have been added to the show accommodations at the stock yards. Entries have been so large that the management is busy struggling with an overflow. It is promised that the exhibit of breeding stock will be the greatest ever seen in the West and the Horse Show will have new features that will stir up the greatest interest. The poultry show, which is added this year for the first time, will be the greatest exhibition of the kind ever seen west of the Missouri river. The car load exhibit of stock will tax the full capacity of the Union stock yards and stockmen are coming from all parts of the country, not only to see, but to buy some of Colorado's wonderful cattle.

The big stock show at Denver was started to advance the interests of agriculture and live stock in the West, and it has been making good. It has an educational value to the farmer and stockmen impossible to underestimate. Denver is proud of this big annual event that has grown in such a short time to national proportions and a warm and hearty invitation is being sent to the whole West to come to Denver and enjoy the show and profit through it. The railroads have made low rates and Denver is ready to entertain 50,000 people from outside.
