Wheat .75 bushel.
Corn .35 bushel.
Oats .30 bushel.
Potatoes .75 bushel.
Hay and other feed, \$5 per ton.
Hogs \$6 per cwt.
Chickens \$3 per dozen.
Cattle \$5 per cwt.
Cows assessed at actual sales value.

Stallions and Jacks 50 times service fee.

All other property at actual value in accordance with law.
