CAPPER PLAN TIRES.

The Wilson World makes the point that the self laudation and personal booming in which the Topeka Capital indulges in the interest of its publisher's candidacy for governor, grows rather wearisome. That is one of the reasons why there should be a law against a newspaper man running for office. There is a big temptation to forget the obligation to give the reader the news of the day and to use the space for supposed personal advancement.

In an attempt to make it appear that the farmers of this country will be injured by 'free wheat' imported from Canada, the Jewell Republican of last week tried to show that wheat is higher in the United States than in Canada, but if the editor of the Republican had looked at the Kansas City Star of the same date as the Republican he would have discovered these quotations on wheat: 'Winnipeg, May wheat, 92 3-4; Minneapolis, May wheat 91 1-2; Winnipeg, July wheat, 94 3-4; Minneapolis, July wheat, 93c.' He would also have discovered that in February the United States exported wheat to the amount of 7,289,000 bushels, for the free trade markets of the world, and that since July the United States has exported 108,959,000 bushels of wheat, or six millions of bushels more than was exported during the same period one year ago. Also, that on Friday last, Winnipeg received 189 cars of wheat while Chicago received but 22. Apparently, the Canadians are not shipping all their wheat to this country.
