SCHOOL EXAMINATION.

The following is a report of the School Examination, August 10th, 1875, Allen county, Kansas:

There were thirty applicants, only four of whom failed to get certificates. There were eighty questions submitted on which the grade was fixed. The rating is 90, 80 and 70 per cent.

BROKE JAIL.

Last Saturday morning sheriff Woodin had the following notices printed on postal cards:

"Broke jail on the night of August 6th, 1875, one Robert Miller, age 28, height 6 feet, hair black, eyes grey, complexion dark, weight about 145 pounds, spare built. Also James Hays, age 34, height 5 ft. 10 in., hair black, eyes hazel, complexion dark, weight about 175 lbs. —devilish eye. \$25 will be paid for each or either of these men, or a suitable reward for information leading to their capture."

The sheriff and his deputy started out early Saturday morning on the hunt for these escaped prisoners, but up to the time of going to press nothing has been heard of them. These men were from adjoining counties, Miller from Montgomery and Hays from Howard; the former was accused of horse stealing and the latter of murder. Miller is reported as an old hand at jail breaking having escaped from several jails in the State. They had with them when put in jail so secreted as to escape detection, or were supplied by parties outside, saws with which to cut out the fastenings of their cell and saw off the iron bars in one of windows. They made their escape without waking the other prisoners confined in the jail.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

IOLA, KANSAS, August 5, 1875.

COUNCIL CHAMBER:—Council met pursuant to adjournment. Mayor Jones in the chair; whereupon the roll was called, and the Councilmen answering to their names were: N. F. Acers, C. M. Simpson, G. W. Apple and W. H. Richards. Absent, J. H. Richards. Quorum present.

The minutes of preceding meeting were then read and upon motion the same were approved by the Council.

The bill of John Willis, City Marshal, for one month's salary from July 1st to August 1st, 1875, at the rate of fifteen dollars per month, and for services in killing and carrying away a dog, 75 c., the total being \$15.75, was presented and referred to the Committee on Finance, with instructions to report on the same immediately, whereupon the said Committee after due examination of said bill reported that the same was correct and recommended that the same be allowed, and thereupon on motion the said bill was allowed by the Council and the Clerk was ordered to draw an order for the amount payable out of the general fund of the city.

The City Attorney then reported Ordinance No. 141, 142, 143 and 144. Ordinance No. 141 being in reference to the assessment of special sidewalk tax upon certain lots in blocks 80, 50, 51, 47, 94, 20, 29, 36, 45 and 52 in the city of Iola, Kansas, and certain lots in block 2 Rhoades' Addition to the city of Iola. Ordinance No. 142 being in reference to repairing sidewalks in the city of Iola. Ordinance No. 143 being in reference to the levying of taxes for general and special purposes in the city of Iola for the year 1875. And Ordinance No. 144 being in reference to the adoption of certain sanitary measures within the limits of the city of Iola.

Ordinance No. 141 was then taken up and read the first and second times by its title, and on motion, the rules having been suspended, said Ordinance was placed upon its final passage, read by sections and section first being read and the roll being called the vote on the passage of said section stood as follows: Ayes—Acers, Simpson, Apple and Richards; nays—none. Section second then being read, and the roll being called the vote upon the passage of said section stood as follows: Ayes—Acers, Simpson, Apple and Richards; nays—none. Section third then being read and the roll being called the vote on the adoption of said section stood as follows: Ayes—Acers, Simpson, Apple and Richards; nays—none. Section fourth then being read and the roll being called the vote on the adoption of said section stood as follows: Ayes—Acers, Simpson, Apple and Richards; nays—none. Thereupon said Ordinance No. 141 was on motion adopted as a whole

ORDINANCE NO. 145.

(Published August 14th, 1875.)

An ordinance entitled an ordinance in reference to levying an assessment of special tax against certain lots in block 59 in the city of Iola, Allen county, Kansas, to pay for a sidewalk built and constructed abutting thereon by the city of Iola in said county and state:

Be it ordained by the mayor and councilmen of the city of Iola, as follows: SECTION 1. That the sum of forty-eight and one-half cents per linear front foot be and the same is hereby assessed against the following lots situated in said city of Iola, to-wit: one, two, three, four, five and eight in block fifty-nine, in the city of Iola, Allen county, State of Kansas, for the purpose of paying for a twelve foot sidewalk, to be built by the said city of Iola in accordance with the provisions of Ordinance No. 140 of the ordinances of the said city of Iola, as follows:
