At the primary convention held by the Republicans of Iowa township at the court house last Wednesday night L. A. Thresher and W. G. Allison were chosen delegates to the Senatorial convention which meets at Iowa, August 24th, 1876. T. S. Stover and John Harris were elected alternates.

The Republicans of Iowa township, at their primary meeting last Wednesday evening, elected the following persons as delegates to attend the District Convention at the court house to-day: J. W. Scott, R. B. Stevenson, A. G. Jones, J. C. Coffield, E. L. Marsh, J. A. Hart, J. N. White, L. L. Low, A. J. McCarty, S. J. Cowan.

A marriage on wheels was the novelty last Thursday. J. H. Jamison and Catharine Buckner drove up to the court house in a wagon and called for a marriage license. Judge Acers invited them into the office, but they declined the invitation, so he stood out on the pavement and the bride and groom stood up in the wagon and had their destinies legally united and went on their way rejoicing.

Some degenerate wretches recently entered the house of the Ferrel brothers—a few miles north-east of Iowa—while they were away from home and stole all of their clothing, together with a lot of books, jewelry, trinkets and some money. Mr. Booth had a number of articles at the house which were also taken, and among them were photographs of children that are now dead, that were valuable only to himself and he thinks the thieves might at last return these. Diligent search has been made but nothing learned of the sneak thieves.

Mr. Harris informs us that work will again be suspended to-day and Monday on the road west of the river, but will be commenced again next Tuesday. Good headway was made in the work of grading during this week, and the indications now are that instead of this being the worst road in the county it will be one of the best. The farmers in that part of the county show a commendable zeal in this enterprise, some of them having subscribed as much as twenty-five dollars each. Mr. Harris thinks there are still a number of persons in town—property holders—who are interested enough in this matter to subscribe four or five dollars each, or at least send a man and team one day. Come forward gentlemen, and don't say that the business men and those who travel over the road should pay all the expense of this much needed improvement.

CORRECTION.

In the Treasurer's quarterly statement as published last week the following mistakes were made by the printer: The L. L. & G. railroad bond fund was given as \$788.69, when it should have been \$789.65; Deer Creek township fund \$55.68 should have been township road fund. The Iowa city fund was given as \$94.43 when it should have been \$94.43. With these corrections the report foots up all right.

Surrounded by good land, settled by quiet, industrious citizens. We have one Methodist, one United Brethren, and one Presbyterian Church within one and one-fourth mile of the Station. One select and four public schools within two and one-half miles.

We also want a good blacksmith. No shop nearer than Iowa. The post office and station is at the cross roads, east of Deer Creek.

POLITICAL.

Elsewhere in to-day's paper will be found the call for a Senatorial convention, to be held at Iowa the 24th of this month, for the purpose of nominating a Republican candidate for the Senatorial district comprising Allen and Anderson counties. The Secretary of the Central Committee of Allen county—at the request of a member of the Senatorial central Committee—requested that at the primary meeting last Wednesday evening, held for the purpose of electing delegates to the district convention to-day, delegates also be chosen for the Senatorial convention. This we presume has been done, and is all right excepting that they have chosen too many. The member of the Senatorial committee who made the suggestion that the delegates be selected last Wednesday said that the number would be the same as it was two years ago; but this was a mistake, as will be seen by reference to the call. It will be necessary for the delegates chosen to decide who of their number shall represent their townships, or if they cannot agree their township will have to do it for them.

Although the nomination is conceded to an Anderson county man, every township in our county should be represented in the convention, as an evidence of our interest in the matter and our determination to give the nominee of the convention a hearty support.

LIPPINCOTT'S MAGAZINE.

The various departments in the August number of this popular monthly are well and ably sustained, and in point of merit it is difficult to decide which contribution is worthy to rank as first on the list of contents. The eighth illustrated article on "The Century; its Fruits and its Festival," embraces the concluding chapters on the exhibits in the main building, and is marked by the same ability as was displayed in its predecessors. Mr. Edward King's illustrated account of Montenegro is especially interesting and timely in connection with the war which is now going on there. As a sketch of the life and habits of the people of the Black Mountain, this paper will be read with pleasure and interest. Col. Robert Lewis Kimberly's "Raising the siege of Chattanooga," is a spirited narrative of an important operation performed by the army of the Cumberland during our late war. The second chapter of Robert Wilson's papers, "On the Eastern Shore of Maryland," is not the less interesting than the first, which has already attracted much attention. Besides the continuation of Lady Barker's enjoyable letters from South Africa, there is an essay on the "Age of Knick-Knacks," by Lady Blanche Murphy; "Cross Purposes," a pleasant tale, by Margaret Vandegrift; and the first of R. Davey's papers on George Sand, which is a pleasing tribute to the character and memory of the great authoress. "Phantasmagoria," by Emma Lazarus, and "By the Water's Edge," by W. S. Phillips, are the poems of the month, and are of marked merit. The new serial tale, by Ellen W. Olney, "Love in Idleness," commenced in this number, gives promise of a literary treat, and we venture to predict that the tale will rank high in modern fiction. The usual editorial and book reviews complete this number of the popular Lippincott.
