THE COURT HOUSE. Some Additional Opinions about it. We cannot spare space to publish in full all the additional letters we have received, but give the substance of each. J. A. HEATH, Of Humboldt, thinks that with the repairs spoken of, the old buildings could be made to last ten or fifteen years, and is of the opinion that bonds could not be voted at this time. A PROMINENT MERCHANT Of Humboldt, who does not wish his name published, is opposed to the expenditure of even half the amount named in our letter on the old buildings, and favors building new ones when the proper time arrives. He also thinks that inasmuch as Iola has donated the site, she ought also to "plant trees, lay out the grounds, and otherwise fit them for occupancy." For his information we will say that the trees are already planted and are vigorously growing, and that the city of Iola will lay out walks and drives and do all other things necessary to make the Court House Square handsome and convenient. DR. WAKEFIELD, Of Humboldt, thinks it poor economy to spend money in repairing the old buildings, but is opposed to building new ones at this time. He is satisfied that the majority of the citizens of the county favor the location of the county seat nearer the central part of the county. B. DAWSON, Of Moran, thinks that it might be the best economy to erect new buildings, yet doubts whether a majority of the people of the county will be willing to vote the necessary bonds, on account of the county seat question. He thinks that the proposition will be met with a solid wall of opposition in the eastern and a great majority in the southern part of the county, and that this, together with the class of people who are opposed to voting bonds on general principles, will render it forever impossible to build a new court house at Iola with public funds. PAUL FISHER, Of Humboldt, thinks the REGISTER is entitled to much credit for the care it has taken to present the court house and jail matter fairly and fully before the people. He would like to know through upon what grounds Judge Stillwell and the grand jury condemn the jail from a sanitary standpoint. His observation has been that nobody has died there, while a number have grown fat. As regards the court house, he thinks it would be a waste of money to spend \$1,671.00 or any other considerable sum in repairs. In conclusion he thinks that the town or community fairly located, that will furnish suitable grounds and contribute the largest sum in money toward new buildings ought to be allowed the county seat. He will therefore oppose voting bonds for buildings at Iola unless after a fair contest Iola shows herself entitled to retain the county seat. H. ENGLISH, Of Elm township, thinks that by the time repairs were made on old court house and jail it would amount to nearer \$10,000 than \$5,000, but is in favor of postponing building new ones until next year, provided the old buildings will be safe for that length of time. He is not in favor of repairing the old buildings under any circumstances, and wants the court house and jail put under one roof and located in the public square at Iola. S. D. WHITTINGTON, Of Osage, is somewhat carried away by Humboldt's offer of \$25,000. (He should remember, however, that it is only the Inter-State that makes that offer. None of the reliable business men of Humboldt have signed any pledge to that effect.) He thinks that under the circumstances the old buildings are good enough. C. L. KNOWLTON, Of Geneva, after interviewing a large number of the citizens of his township, finds the opinion divided as to whether new buildings are needed or not, but almost solid in the opinion that when they are needed they should be paid for by a direct levy extending over two years, and should be located in the center of the public square at Iola. G. W. MOON, Ex-Commissioner from Humboldt township, is opposed to spending any such amount as the bids indicate upon the old court house. Realizes that something must be done for it or it will soon fall down. As for the jail, he thinks it can't be improved without a new one. G. DEWITT, Ex-County Surveyor, of Humboldt township, says: "That the old building is not safe needs no argument. Any man who will take one look at it will come to that conclusion at once. But I supposed it could be fixed for less money than you figure. I cannot think it would be wise to spend five or six thousand dollars on that old building." JUST AS GOOD.
