STRUCK BY THE TRAIN

North Bound Santa Fe Tossed Two Humboldt People into a Hedge

MORAN WALLOPS HUMBOLDT

She Gives the Tiger's Tail a Twist in the Tune of 49 to 1.

The north bound night train of the Santa Fe struck the light buggy in which Henry Hauser and his girl were driving home from Humboldt Monday, completely demolishing the buggy, and killing the horse, and never touched the occupants. It was the most miraculous accident that ever happened in these parts. There were two couples of young people returning to their homes south-east of Humboldt and the first rig had passed the crossing in safety. The road runs alongside the track for some distance and the occupants of the buggy should have been able to see the train for several miles, had they been thinking of trains. The road turns to the left and crosses the track. The night train was late and was sifting along gaily and struck the buggy squarely. The horse was killed instantly, the buggy torn into a shapeless mass and the young people were thrown into the air thirty or forty feet, alighting in the top of a hedge fence. When the train was stopped and run back the crew found Hauser and the girl, perfectly calm, searching the ruins of their outfit to see if they could find enough to ride home in. Hauser was not injured in the slightest degree and the girl had only a few scratches on her face from the hedge.

The Football Game.

Neither team played its regular men, but the Moran team had some kind of an organization and played a little team work, with the foregoing result. Old residents of the county, and especially Humboldt people, will remember the Tanner brothers, who came to that town years ago and engaged in the department store business. They brought with them 2000 pennies and introduced the fashion of making smaller change than a nickel. They won a reputation as hustlers and good business men, went later to Topeka and made lots of money in the same line. Wm. Cunningham, speaking of them, said he remembered that he was in business at the same time, and when Tanner Bros. offered kerosene at 10 cents, while the wholesale price was 11 cents, he kept a brigade of boys carrying oil from their store to his.

This morning Mr. J. M. Tanner, and Mr. Davenport, of Emporia, were in Iola, and it seems to be understood that they have in view the choosing of a location for a store. Just what kind of a store, or what line of goods, could not be learned, as nothing is at all definite as yet. That they would be an addition to the business interests of the town and help extend its reputation as a good trading point seems certain.

IMMENSE MACHINERY

One of the Twenty-one Rotaries for the Cement Plant Arrives

The cement works has been delayed in construction by the inability of the foundries to furnish the contracted machinery and when one sees what kind of things come under the head of machinery the surprise at the delay ceases. Tuesday one of the twenty-one rotaries which form a part of the plant was received Tuesday an ether and a third is reported on the way. This rotary is sixty feet long, six feet in diameter and is a solid metal tube which revolves on cog wheels, the mixture which ultimately becomes cement being roasted inside. It is estimated that one rotary weighs close to thirty tons. They will be put in the two large buildings on the north and south of the completed machinery buildings in rows of seven and all will be turned by a series of cog wheels. It was an interesting job to get the things off the cars, two of which are required for each rotary, but a glimpse of one of them convinces the skeptic that the largest factory in southeastern Kansas is getting itself together at Iola.

ARMY REORGANIZATION.

Congressman Hull Says Some Measure of a General Character Will Probably Be Presented to Congress.

Washington, Jan. 3.—Chairman Hull, of the house committee on military affairs, says some measure of a general character relating to the organization of the army probably will be presented at this session of congress. Mr. Hull has conferred with war department officials prior to the holidays with a view to reaching an understanding on what was needed in the way of military legislation and, it is understood that bills are being prepared for submission later. He says the present law will be a temporary measure, but as it specifically provides that the present organization of the army shall cease on July 1, 1901, it is imperative that this congress do something in the way of army organization. He holds the view, however, that conditions are too unsettled in the Philippines and elsewhere to say definitely as to the number of troops needed in a permanent organization, but is confident that there never will be a reduction of the regular army back to 28,000.

There are several general features of army organization which Mr. Hull believes will be embodied in such legislation as is enacted. These include the three battalion formation which was a marked departure inaugurated by the last act and has given general satisfaction. Another feature is that allowing the army to "expand from within" by increasing the numerical strength of the companies instead of creating new regiments. Mr. Hull says this feature has proved most beneficial as it gives an elastic organization, capable of ready expansion in time of need without additional officers and an entire new organization. The staff organization of the army also is likely to receive attention. Secretary Root favors a change in the present system with a view to having a "detail staff" that is staff bureaus recruited largely from the line of the army. This would be a marked departure as the present staff bureaus are almost entirely permanent. Among military experts there is said to be considerable difference of opinion on this point, as the German, French and other continental military systems have permanent staff organizations.

 The hearing in the probate court in for J. Schultz resulted in the jury order that one be appointed and the court will await the recommendation of the attorneys.
