

## Letter From Harry Hiner.

A member of the REGISTER force has received the following letter from Harry Hiner, now serving with the army in Luzon, Philippine Islands:

Oram, P. I., Sept. 11, 1900.

I write you again briefly in reference to my own welfare and the condition of things here. I see no change in the insurrection (or guerilla warfare as it is termed.) On last November the general advance from Angeles put the insurgents on the bum, but since that time they have been operating in small bands. On December 3 the Twenty-third started on the advance with Gen. Fred D. Grant to Zambales and Bataan Provinces where we have been doing garrison duty ever since. At different times it has been exciting in this (Bataan) province as it is close to Manila Bay which affords means of transportation to the insurgents, and our troops cover so much ground it is hard to do anything with them as they can go to the mountains at any time and back again easily.

These bands of insurgents are aware of every move the Americans make to capture and suppress them and they lay in concealment until our troops come along, then fire a volley and run to the mountains and hide their rifles. On several occasions we have killed insurgents with three suits of clothes on. First a suit of insurgent uniform, then a laborer's suit and on top an Amigo's suit. You cannot tell who is a friend.

I am chief clerk in the Quartermaster's department and getting along fine with little work to do. It is rumored we are to leave here about the last of December and I hope it is true. Remember me to all friends.
