DEATH OF MR. J. R. YOUNG

Old Resident of Iola Passed Quietly Away Thursday After Long Life of Usefulness.

J. R. Young, one of the oldest residents of Allen county, died Thursday at 11:20 at his residence, corner Madison and Buckeye streets, in this city.

For a long time Mr. Young has been a sufferer from asthma, several acute attacks threatening to end his life. Thanks to a rugged constitution and a clean life he survived until his eighty-second year.

"Riley" Young, as he was familiarly known to hundreds of Allen county people, was born in Butler county, O., December 5, 1821. In 1842 he was united in marriage to Sarah Landers and to them were born eight children, of whom two, Mrs. M. A. Reynolds, of Neosho Falls, and John B. Young, of LaCrosse, Ga., are still living.

Mr. Young moved to Kansas in 1857 and he pre-empted a farm west of the river, four miles west of Iola, which he still owned at the time of his death. In 1862 his first wife died, while they were living on the farm. The following year he married Mrs. Frances V. Dingman, and to them were born two children, Sylvia, who died when sixteen years old, and Docia, now Mrs. D. P. Northrup of this city.

In 1864 deceased moved to Douglas county, buying a farm and store. The store was in the hamlet of Prairie City, near Baldwin, and the farm was the present site of Media. Here he conducted a general merchandise business for one year when he sold out and moved to Iola. This was in 1865, and he and J. C. Clark formed a partnership and engaged in the general store business on the south side of the square, where the Hartung harness store now is.

In 1885 Mr. Young sold his business to Dr. Ewart. For two years he took life easy but finding his time hanging on his hands he opened a boot and shoe store in his re-built south side store. Later he added dry goods, but in 1890 he sold the business to D. Ewart and retired permanently, owing to poor health.

During his last illness he was surrounded by his children and wife and was privileged to see and talk with them before death. The cause of his death was pronounced by the doctors to be gangrene of the lungs, and was the direct result of the repeated attacks of asthma.

Out of a large family of children a sister of the deceased, Mrs. Emmons, who lives at the old family farm in Ohio, is now the sole survivor. All the children, Mrs. Reynolds, John Young and Mrs. Northrup were in attendance at his side during his closing days.

Prof. Haworth is here. Iola has spent many hundreds of dollars in advertising her oil and gas, her minerals and her factories, and yet probably the most valuable advertising which she has received has been the reports of the geologists and specialists sent out by the State and government to make official reports of the facts.

In this way Iola gas and oil factories have been written up over the signatures of unbiased experts and the facts thus published have helped much. Prof. E. Haworth, of the chair of geology of the State University, accompanied by his assistant geologist, his steno-grapher and an expert craftsman, are now in Iola to make a new and more complete report along these same lines.

He has secured the room of the gas office for headquarters and expects to remain here

Allen County Oil Field. Prospect Bright that it Will Soon Run the Gas Field Close for First Honors.

Speaking of a recent strike there the Humboldt Union says: "As stated in last week's Union, the Crude Oil people drilled in on the Fussman farm Thursday of last week, and intended to shoot the well on Friday.

Land For a New Industry.

The REGISTER some time ago told of the new deal by which a company largely of local men had become interested in the car seal lock patented by one of the Edgars. It was decided to subscribe money, build a factory and manufacture the car seals, using Iola cement for the destructible part of the lock instead of glass as first planned.

The site of the factory has been purchased of the Northrup estate and it has been staked off. The site lies just west of the Santa Fe depot and south of the ice plant. It has a frontage on West street of 140 feet and extends back 300 feet. Work on the plant is to begin in the near future and it is hoped that the advantages of this seal over those now in use will appeal so strongly to the railroads that it will be generally adopted and that the factory, starting on a small scale, will grow to be a large concern.

Heim Buys Oil Land. J. J. Heim, the Kansas City brewer who had a dream for awhile of piping Iola gas to Kansas City and making a fortune out of it while Allen county suffered, now has a better scheme. He plans to develop Allen county oil lands and in this he has the good will of the community.

The Chanute oil boom has been steadily creeping up the river and already the land over in Allen county is considered to be the very best of oil land. Numerous wells are already planned and Heim will doubtless thoroughly prospect his holdings.
