The Kansas Salt Industry.
Ashland Citizen.

The salt industry of Kansas is becoming an important one and one whose magnitude is little thought of. It beats the sorghum business all to pieces. In the year 1886, the year of its discovery, there were 13,000 barrels produced. Last year Kansas took her place among the largest salt producing states. Salt was first struck at Ellsworth at a depth of 730 feet, then at Hutchinson, Lyons, Great Bend, Nickerson, Kingman and Anthony. Hutchinson has twelve plants in operation, each turning out from 500 to 1200 barrels per day. Anthony ranks next as the most important center, her two plants having a daily output of 1500 barrels. However, all the towns mentioned have salt plants in operation and it is believed that in the future all salt used west of the Mississippi river will be supplied by Kansas.
