

**THE RIOT AT HULL.**

Scene in the Canadian Parliament on Account of the Maltreatment of Evangelists.

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 13.—In the House of Commons last night, the riot at Hull was brought up by Mr. Charlton, M. P. He was ordered to desist by the Speaker on a point of order. Mr. McMullin moved that the Speaker leave the chair and characterized his ruling as that of an interested party and wholly unjust.

Speaker Quimet, a French Canadian, then allowed Mr. Charlton to continue and he characterized the riot as one of the most disgraceful attacks ever made upon the freedom of speech and universal religious suffrage. A small band of Protestant evangelists were stoned, beaten and threatened with death for proclaiming the truths of the Christian religion by a howling mob of French Canadians. The authorities were totally unable to cope with the crowd and the fact that murder was not committed was simply a miracle. This matter demanded the immediate attention of the Government. If immediate action was not taken he charged the Government with foul injustice and neglect.

Sir John Macdonald, in a rage, charged Mr. Charlton with posing as the champion of a particular religious class. He despised such an action and said if the last speaker had any sincerity he would have formed one of an escort to protect the evangelists. The matter was one which could only be dealt with by the Government of the Province of Quebec. All that was necessary to quell the riots was for two magistrates to sign a requisition and all the military of Canada would have turned out to protect the evangelists. He charged Mr. Charlton with a desire to raise a disturbance and animosities.

Mr. Charlton, now thoroughly aroused, arose but was greeted with a perfect storm of abuse. The Speaker ordered him to stop speaking, but he refused. A tremendous uproar followed and insulting remarks were hurled from one side of the House to the other.

Mr. Charlton insisted upon replying, but the Speaker objected, and Hon. Peter Mitchell attacked Speaker Quimet for injustice and moved an adjournment. Mr. Charlton, continuing, said that the utterances of the Premier were false and calculated to cause civil war. [Tremendous uproar.] If the Government continued, an armed Protestant force would be raised in Ottawa to clean out the French-Canadians in Hull.

Mr. Flynn characterized Mr. Charlton as a firebrand. After a continued uproar lasting nearly half an hour the matter was allowed to drop.

**MUCH CONFUSION.**

The Rush into the Sioux Lands—Many Claimants to Each Lot.

PIERRE, S. D., Feb. 13.—Tuesday afternoon Colonel Lassen, in command of the military at Fort Pierre, received an official telegram from the War Department officially announcing the President's proclamation opening the Sioux reservation and that the military forces should be withdrawn. Information to this effect was sent to the daily papers of this city, and immediately extra copies were put out announcing the fact. Vehicles of all kinds were immediately called out and packed with men of all classes and there was an exciting race for the reservation. Every body who could get transportation joined the excited crowd, and those who could not ride walked. In thirty minutes the town was practically deserted; stores closed and business almost suspended.

At Fort Pierre the situation is serious. The bulk of the crowd first struck that village and immediately commenced to claim town lots, there being as many as ten claimants to one lot. Some trouble has already arisen and the indications are that before long there will be some fighting by those who are disputing the possession of lots, as ten wagon loads of beer and whisky left this city for Fort Pierre with several gambling outfits. The liquor had been prevented on the reservation heretofore, but last night it was as free as water. Gambling was going on openly in the streets last night. F. W. Pettigrew, brother of Senator Pettigrew, has charge of the town and is at the head of a vigilance committee in the absence of any law. He will profit immensely from the sale of Fort Pierre town lots.

**ORLEANS' ESCAPE.**

The Court Thinks Two Years in Jail Will About Meet His Case.

PARIS, Feb. 12.—The Duke of Orleans, son of the Count and Countess of Paris, who came to Paris last week with the avowed intention of enlisting in the French army, and who was then arrested on the charge of violating the law exiling from France all pretenders to the French throne, was again arraigned before the tribunal of the Seine to-day. He was adjudged guilty of violating the law and was sentenced to two years' imprisonment.

Before judgment was announced the Duke addressed the court in his own behalf. He said: "I came to France to serve as a common soldier. I have nothing to do with politics, which only concerns my father, whose obedient son and faithful servant I am. I knew that by entering France I rendered myself liable to the law, but that knowledge did not stop me. I love my country and wish to serve her. I am guilty of no crime."

The Duke will be allowed to remain in the conciergerie for a few weeks before being removed to jail. The Government grants him this privilege in order to give him an opportunity to appeal from the sentence of the courts.
