According to this our factory will be able to supply a very small portion of the demand for its goods.

PITTSBURG, COLUMBUS & FT. SMITH.

A petition signed by 61 citizens asking the city council to appropriate \$100 to help pay the expense of making a preliminary survey of a line of the Pittsburg, Columbus and Ft. Smith railway from Pittsburg to the territory line via Pleasantview township and Baxter Springs, was presented to the council at the meeting Tuesday evening. Two members thought the city ought not to make the appropriation and after some discussion the petition was withdrawn. It was thought best to raise the amount by private subscription. This line of road is chartered via Columbus, but as its construction will depend largely upon the amount of subsidies that may be obtained and as the proposed route via Baxter Springs can be built much cheaper, is fully as short and can make a much better showing, it is thought, in the matter of subsidies, it might be well for the people of this city to wake up a little and try to secure the road. A majority of the directors are somewhat opposed to the eastern line, but have consented to make the survey if the people interested along the route will pay the expense, about \$250. The Pittsburg people prefer the east line and it is possible that after the survey has been made the objections to it may be withdrawn and the road built this way instead of several miles west.

OBITUARY.

Died, in this city, Monday, Sept. 29, at 9 o'clock a. m., Clarissa B. Tutton, widow of the late John S. Tutton, aged 72 years, 11 months and 3 days. Funeral services were held at the residence Tuesday afternoon conducted by Rev. M. E. Bramhall and attended by a large number of friends.

Mrs. Tutton was the mother of Mrs. G. G. Gregg and John E. Tutton, a highly respected christian lady and leaves a single sister to mourn her departure. She was one of the pioneers of this country, having come to Baxter Springs in 1868 from Illinois. Her husband died a few years later from wounds received in the late war.
