The business of the Baxter Springs Mfg. Co., is steadily increasing and its territory gradually getting broader. They have recently exchanged stock in the company for a large saw mill in the pluries of Arkansas whereby they get several millions of feet of as fine hard pine as ever laid out of doors. This arrangement will enable them to get raw material at the very lowest notch. The Banner wind engine took first premium at the recent Wichita fair over several of the very best wind mills made and the consequence is that orders for the Banner are coming in from that section of the state faster than they can be filled. The company will soon establish a branch distributing agency at Wichita and ship its goods to that point in car lots. The company now have in their employ about 50 men and if the present bright prospects prevail no less than a hundred will be required to run the business next year.

Last week a severely painful and serious accident occurred in our midst. Mrs. George Fenton, who has been troubled with granulated eye lids for years, Saturday last, filled the dropper with what she supposed to be her eye medicine, but mistaking the bottle, took aqua ammonia, commonly called hartshorn.
