The Kansas state house doors which are to take the place of those broken down by the republicans in entering the building last winter, were finished at the Baxter Springs planing mill this week and will be on exhibition at the Baxter bank for a few days. They are excellent specimens of workmanship, having been built almost wholly by John Royer, who has an enviable reputation as a fine workman. The doors are over eight feet in height, almost three inches thick and are double veneered, being cherry on one side and oak on the other. They are furnished by the republican members of the house through Col. Alexander Warner to the state free of charge, the only consideration being that they receive the old doors, which they will hold as trophies of the memorable contest at Topeka last winter.

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
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
