NEWS IN BRIEF.

A. F. Van Auken, charged with forging the name of President Ingalls of the Big Four railroad to a bond for \$30,000, fell from a train near Quincy, Ill., and was fatally injured.

The Peninsular land and lumber company, a corporation doing business in Pittsburg, is said to have swindled creditors in Menominee, Mich., out of more than \$40,000 in lumber bought on time and then resold.

Chairman Wilson of the house ways and means committee and Congressman Tarsney of Missouri with their wives will leave Washington next Tuesday for a rest in the South.

Superintendent Stump of the immigration bureau, with the approval of Secretary Carlisle, has issued a circular concerning the arrest and deportation of alien contract laborers.

Congressman Hall of Missouri, has introduced, by request, a bill providing that two or more patents be obtained for an invention whether it is capable of division mechanically or on physical lines, or the applications differ merely in the former scope of claims presented.

The Watkins bill to punish prize fighters and abettors of prize fighting passed the Iowa house of representatives by a unanimous vote.

James L. Myrick, one of the Oliphant, Ark., train robbers was found guilty of murder in the first degree. It was in this hold up that Conductor McNally was killed.

The Burlington earnings for 1893 were over half a million less than for 1892.

Joseph H. Faber has been arrested at St. Joseph on a charge of perjury in falsely swearing to help his mother-in-law secure a pension.

Judge Leas has declared marriage between whites and blacks illegal in Arkansas.

The rod mills of the Illinois Steel company at Joliet started up with 200 men. Next Thursday the rail mill will start.

Despite the complaint that post-office changes are not being made fast enough figures show that the record of Messrs. Bissell and Maxwell is up to the standard.

J. Beck, wanted at Clinton, Mo., for fraud of all kinds, was arrested at Monroe City, Kan.

Dr. August Hirsch, a famous German physician and expert on epidemics, died in Berlin.

The Creek congressional delegation to Washington has returned home and has begun work against statehood.

It is announced that a stalwart Democratic paper will make its appearance in Arkansas City, Kan., in a few days.

Barlow Brown, aged 17, of Houstonia, Mo., attempted suicide by taking rat poison. His life was saved.

The Baptist Ministers' association of Chicago has petitioned congress to increase the tax on whisky to \$1.50 per gallon.

The Jacobites held a memorial service in London at midnight to commemorate the anniversary of the execution of Charles I., who was beheaded in 1649. They also decorated the statue of Charles I. at Charing Cross.

The Rye Mills company cotton mills of 8,000 spindles at Oldham, England, have been destroyed by fire. Loss \$500,000.

John Costello shot his wife and 16-year-old daughter in Pittsburg, Pa., because they refused to sleep in the house with him. Both will probably die.

At Tiffin, Ohio, a young man shot and fatally wounded Miss Kittie Kless, and then killed himself, because she had refused to accept his attentions because of his bad habits.

Judge Reed of the district court at Wichita, Kan., has decided that the city of Wichita and not the property owners must pay for paving which cost \$78,000. The paving petition had not been signed by a majority of the owners of abutting property.

A poor man's party has been organized at Shelbyville, Ill. No man whose possessions are valued at over \$1,500 is to be nominated or receive support for office.

John J. Hurst, a ranchman in Malad, Idaho, suspected his wife of undue intimacy with Morgan R. Morgan, a neighbor, and after a quarrel with her sent for Morgan and shot him dead.

A bill has been introduced in the Iowa legislature to prohibit the publication by the newspapers of the state of prize fight accounts or descriptions of prize fights.

A reported discovery of gold in Williams canon, near the Cave of the Winds, at Manitou, Col., caused a rush from the town to that locality by street cars and other conveyances. Hundreds of claims were staked. Assays of the ore that was found ran from \$1,500 to \$10,000 per ton.

The Princess Ferdinand of Bulgaria gave birth to a son. The event was announced by a salute of 101 guns.

The patent on the famous electric telephone invention of Professor Alexander Graham Bell of Boston has expired.
