HOW I MAKE FARMING PAY.

I will give my experience in farming. I have a small farm of 100 acres--have 70 acres in cultivation, a good orchard and the rest in pasture land, with plenty of good water on it, and since I have decided to quit raising cotton I think I will do better. I have now 18 acres in wheat that looks fine; have 20 in oats, and will put 20 in corn. I plant a small patch of sugar cane to feed to my hogs in summer; a patch of kaffir corn that I cut for winter feed. I keep plenty of work horses, and I make it a rule to rise early; so I plow deep while sluggards sleep.

I buy improved farm implements as fast as I am able. I keep enough milk cows to give all the milk and butter we use, and a few pounds to sell every week. My two boys and I do the milking. My wife attends to the milk, and I help her with the churning. I buy all the groceries we want with butter, eggs and chickens.

I have a regular day every week to take my produce to town, and I generally keep my groceryman in my debt. I raise plenty of hogs to make my meat, and have some to sell. I do not go in debt for anything. I only plant a few acres in cotton, and then in the fall, after I have my crop all gathered the boys and I pick cotton for my neighbors. I have 300 bushels of corn to sell now. I always try to take something to sell when I go to town. I think one great reason so many farmers fail is they overcrop themselves and a rainy spell comes on and weeds and grass get the start of them, and they never can get out. I put in what I can cultivate well, stir the soil well all the time, whether it rains or not, and I generally make plenty to do me.

It seems to me with plenty of milk, butter, eggs and chickens, vegetables and fruit, any housewife can set a table good enough for anyone. We always have preserves and jelly enough to do us through the winter, and until fruit comes again. I think that farmers ought to be the happiest people on earth. They can be the most independent if they will.--A. S. GARVIN, Parsons, Texas, in Home and Farm.
