LAW IN FORCE.

AUSTIN, TEX. Jan. 31.—The Texas anti-trust law, passed at the session of the legislature last May, becomes effective tomorrow. This is a most drastic measure, in that it relieves all debtors in the state from paying for any goods bought of any outsiders if said outsider proves to be in any way connected with a trust.

The new city building at Galena which will also be used by the court of common pleas will be a good one, according to the following plan which taken from the Galena Republican: "The first floor, on the Fifth street side, will be used as city clerk and mayor's offices, city attorney, police headquarters, police court and two jails. The lower north rooms will be used by the fire department and for toilet rooms. On the second floor will be the offices of the clerk of the common pleas court, city engineer and sheriff, two jury rooms and court room. The fire department will also have a sleeping room on the second floor. The fire department and jail will have concrete floors and the entire building will be heated with steam. The jail vault will be two stories high and contain twelve cells. There will be a separate jail for women which will be a great improvement over the present one."
