**ORDINANCE NO. 61.**

An ordinance providing for a license tax, and prescribing a penalty for violation thereof.

It is ordained by the mayor and councilmen of the city of Baxter Springs, Kansas:

SECTION 1. No person, company or corporation shall practice, carry on or engage in any of the following callings, businesses, professions or occupations, or run or operate any machine or vehicle named therein without having first paid into the city treasury of the city of Baxter Springs a license tax and procured a license therefor, and charge for such license shall be as follows:

**SECTION 2. Clause 1.** All licenses taxes shall be due and payable before the licensee shall begin his business or occupation, and except when payable daily shall be payable in semi-annual payments to wit: During the first half year and during the first half year and during the month of July for the second half year.

**Clause 2.** All licenses issued shall be subject to revocation by the mayor or upon order of the city council in case of violation by the licensee, or for other sufficient cause.

**Clause 3.** Licenses as provided in this ordinance shall be issued by the city clerk upon applicant presenting a receipt from the city treasurer showing payment to said treasurer of the required amount of the license tax and upon payment to said city clerk of a license fee of twenty-five cents.

**SECTION 3. Clause 1.** It shall be unlawful for any person to practice any or engage in or to run or operate any machine or vehicle named in this ordinance without having paid the license tax and procured the license as required by the provisions of this ordinance, and any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall on conviction thereof, be fined not less than five dollars, nor more than fifty dollars.

**Clause 2.** Every agent, officer or employee of any company or corporation which is required by this ordinance to pay a license tax and who knows that such license tax has not been paid shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this ordinance and shall on conviction thereof be fined not less than five dollars nor more than fifty dollars.

**Clause 3.** It shall be the duty of the City Clerk to file complaint against all persons violating any of the provisions of this ordinance.

**SECTION 4.** All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

**SECTION 5.** For the purpose of fixing the amounts of the several license taxes herein provided for the city clerk is hereby empowered to administer oaths to all applicants for license.

**SECTION 6.** This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after publication by ten written or printed hand bills posted up at ten public places in the city of Baxter Springs, Kansas.


