#### MIAMI-BAXTER LINE.

The Indian Territory Telephone Company has ordered the material for the Miami-Baxter line. This line is to be up to the standard in every respect. No. 10 copper wire is to be used, making a perfect metallic circuit. Thirty-five poles to the mile will be used, poles to be 15 feet high, six-inch top with standard six-pin, 8 feet across arms so other wires can be strung as required. Stromberg-Carlson instruments to be used. The Bell company does not build a better line than this. The line is about 14 miles long.

It is expected that next spring the line will be extended from Miami to Vinita. This would make a copper line from Baxter via Vinita to Oklahoma City.—Vinita Leader.
