sunk to the east this dip will be encountered some 170 feet to the southeast, at a lower depth than the present diggings. This will enable the water to be pumped from the new shaft and allow the work to proceed in dry ground.

No. 3 shaft on the Big Jack land, is proving to be the wonder of the camp. The ore bed is heavy and very rich. The mill was down part of the week on account of repairing the boilers, but will be going at full capacity by the end of the present week. This ore body extends across the entire area and into the McKinley lease on the Catholic Forty, where the same has been demonstrated by four drill holes, showing identically the same formation, and the same ore body.

Work is being pushed on the Lucille Mill which should go into commission the coming month. This joins the Mason mill to the west and has the same ore body as the Mason is demonstrated in its workings. This big mill will add much to the camp's output when it is going at its capacity.

Tom Timothy was in the camp several days the past week looking after the interests of the Common Law Mining Co. He reports operations will be started at once on the property.

Operations are being carried on by the Omaha Petersburg Company, at the old M. K. & T. mine, with very satisfactory results. We understand a large mill is to be installed on this property in the Spring.

Mining Camps to Have Gas

Four more of the mining camps of the mining district will soon be supplied with natural gas for fuel, both for the power plants and for domestic users, the four camps being Miami, Baxter, Spring City and Gramby. The new gas line is to be supplied by the Barnsdall interests from the Oklahoma field.

It is understood that the new pipe line is to be a 16-inch main, and is now being laid as rapidly as possible. It will come by way of Miami, then up to Baxter, then cutting across country to Spring City, and will send a lateral down to Neosho, and then go to Gramby and then have a terminal at Duenweg, supplying a portion of the camp, too.

This pipe line takes in practically all the mining districts not already served by gas from the Kansas Natural. It will provide fuel for camps hitherto dependent upon coal alone. It will also provide gas for domestic use in towns not having enjoyed that privilege so far.

To Spring City it should prove a boon for the mining companies are now compelled to haul their fuel coal from cars at Joplin, which makes fuel cost very high, and places them in a poor position during car shortages.

It is understood that in case of need this line will also furnish gas to the Kansas Natural. Such need is not expected to arise, except in emergency, break downs or bursted pipe lines.
