## Agree on a Bill.

Washington, May 2.—Conferees of both houses of congress on the general service pension bill reached an agreement today on the basis of the senate bill with some increases for advanced age and length of service. This action is said to assure the enactment of the general service bill into law. The conferees were Senators McCumber, Burnham and Gore and Representatives Sherwood, Adair and Sulloway. Messrs. Gore and Sulloway refused to sign the report, the former on the ground that the senate was conceding too much and the latter because it does not concede enough.

The increases grant \$18 a month to soldiers 66 years old who served two and a half years and \$19 to those who served three years. Those 70 years old who served one and one-half years get \$21.50; two years, \$23; two and one-half years, \$24; three years, \$25. Those of 75 years who served one and one-half years get \$27; two and one-half, \$30.

Over 50 counties of Kansas have branch organizations of the Citizens' League whose object is to extend education on the currency problems before the country and secure a sounder monetary system.

Any aim in congress to probe the so-called "Money Trust" must inevitably reveal the methods of the big financiers to put unfair pressure on banks in cornering the vital resources of the nation. It is this pernicious scheme of pressure, which those who seek to humanize traffic in money want destroyed, that makes for money stringency at times, and which, if corrected, will permit of constant independence and prosperity in the business world. Following this probe the remedy will appear, and it is up to the people to force congress to supply the remedy.

That scarcity of cash which precedes a panic is due to the practice of the money pirates of hoarding their wealth, calling in loans and otherwise checking circulation. The banks, under their present system, tighten their hold on reserves and this completes a paralysis of business. It is to prevent a repetition of the panic of 1907, aggravated by just such a tendency to hoard, that the crusade for banking reform is inspired and is advocated by all classes of citizens. Leading in the revolt for a sounder banking system is the National Citizens' League whose Kansas branch is at Abilene where inquiries for information will be answered promptly.
