PRACTICAL BENEFITS OF LIVE STOCK SHOWS



A striking illustration of the direct benefit of a live stock show upon the quality of the live stock grown in the surrounding territory is afforded by the American Royal Live Stock Show which is held annually at Kansas City, Mo. This is recognized as the greatest exhibit of purebred breeding stock held anywhere in the world. It was the outgrowth of the National Hereford Show held at Kansas City in 1899, in which only Hereford cattle were shown. The next year the Short-horns were added, the next year the Aberdeen-Angus, and the next the Galloways, thus taking in the four leading beef breeds. In recent years dairy cattle have been included.

When the National Hereford Show was held in 1899 there were 168 Hereford breeders in Missouri and 103 in Kansas. Today there are 600 Hereford breeders in Missouri, which leads all the states of the Union in the production of purebred Herefords, and 600 in Kansas. The other breeds will show a proportionate increase in

these states. This growth in the production of purebred beef cattle has been the direct result of the American Royal shows and the object lesson they afforded the cattle growers of Missouri and Kansas in quality in beef cattle. At each of the shows from 400 to 500 head of purebred beef cattle have been sold at public auction, and the majority of these have been purchased in Missouri and Kansas and the states of the Southwest where cattle growing has been the leading industry.

A still more conspicuous example of the benefit of such a live stock show is to be found in the case of Texas. In 1899 there were 35 owners of purebred Herefords in Texas, while today there are upwards of 400. Texas cattle growers have been among the most liberal buyers at the American Royal, and as much as \$5,000 has been paid for a single bull to be used on the Texas range. As a result of the use of purebred bulls in the range herds, Texas cattlemen are today pro-

ducing the highest type of beef cattle grown in this country. The bulk of the cattle fed in the corn belt are now produced on the ranges of the Southwest, and these cattle, because of their high quality and uniformity of type, are preferred by the corn belt cattle feeders.

The American Royal will be held in Convention Hall at Kansas City, October 4 to 9, and one of its features will be the sales of purebred cattle.

This will be the first time in the history of the big hall that it has been the scene of auction sales of live stock.

Another feature of this year's American Royal and one that will attract hundreds of cattle feeders from all parts of the corn belt will be the exhibit of range bred cattle in carlots. Upwards of \$500 in prizes will be awarded on this exhibit, and there will be keen competition among the cattle feeders to secure the prize-winning lots from which to make market toppers.
