GARBAGE GODS ARE STILL AT IT

Without Advertising for Bids City Has Allowed Falconer Salvage Co., to "Pick Up" Big Sum.

(Special United Press Wire.) Zurich, Feb. 28.—The German cabinet, following a three-hour session, decided to take most energetic measures to suppress the revolution, according to Berlin dispatches.

The situation in central Germany is said to be growing worse, a state of siege having been proclaimed at Aischaffenburg. Physicians at Leipzig are reported to be on strike.

Government officials in Bochum, Herne, Gelsenkirch and Dortmund have formed an "army of general security," numbering 16,000, to oppose the Spartacans.

Some reports are to the effect that the strike in the Ruhr district is disintegrating, and that only 15,000 workmen remain idle.

Garbage! Garbage! Garbage! Here it is again. The facts are out at last.

If we are correctly informed there is a city ordinance to the effect that no city contract over \$250 can be let by the city without first advertising for bids. But in the letting of the contract to Falconer and Shea to gather up the garbage in this city, the city fathers tied up the taxpayers with a contract way over that amount without advertising for bids on same.

Under the present contract it is costing the city \$2,000 more a month than it did before Falconer and Shea got the contract. We are informed that it costs \$17,000 a month to operate the incinerator. They have three engineers at \$7 per day; three stokers at \$5.50 per day; five men on the floor and four other men at the same rate of wages and with the other wages and running expenses we wonder where the money is to come from.
