

## INLAND EMPIRE TEACHERS MEET

Three Thousand Pedagogues of Northwest Meet in Convention to Consider Important Questions.

(By United Press.)  
 Spokane, April 2.—When the 21st annual convention of the Inland Teachers' association opened here this morning, Spokane was prepared to entertain 3,000 pedagogues of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana.

Educators of national reputation will address the teachers during the three-day convention. The teachers in attendance are being divided into 29 sections, at each of which questions concerning some particular branch of educational work will be considered. Each of the 29 departments will have its own officers.

The instructors at the convention, besides the heads of the northwestern colleges and universities, include Dr. George D. Strayer, Columbia university, the president of the National Educational association; Dr. J. R. Jewell, University of Arkansas, and Miss Sarah E. Richardson, assistant federal director of vocational training, Washington, D. C.

## SPUD GROWERS ARE TOGETHER


By Organization Farmer's of the Yakima Valley Can Prevent Demoralization of the Potato Market.

Associated spud growers are getting better prices the past two weeks, says the Yakima Farmer.

For number ones the growers are getting \$26 and \$26.50, with a good demand. This is considerably less than a fair price for potatoes, but is better than the demoralized market of five and six weeks ago. That the association is responsible for preventing complete market demoralization is admitted by all growers, whether organized or not. Growers disposition to stick to the association for the coming season, in the face of a highly unsatisfactory marketing season, is one of the best evidences of the growing spirit of co-operation among farmers.
