### VOLCANIC ERUPTION IN SOUTH AMERICA

(Special United Press Wire.) Rio Janeiro, April 6.—A violent volcanic eruption in the mountain region near Palmera Dos Indios resulted in the death of many persons and great property damage, according to delayed advices. A sudden explosion about midnight on March 30

blew a crater a mile and a quarter long in a mountain near the village. Huge streams of lava and boiling water destroyed everything in its path down the mountain side. The eruption was accompanied by a hurricane of great intensity which added to the destruction. The eruption is continuing and the population of the entire region is fleeing to the coast. This is the first time any volcanic activities have ever occurred in these mountains. Volcanic disturbances are also reported near Formosa, Municipio and Goyanima. Reports of this eruption is meager.

## FUTURE SAFETY ASSURED FRANCE

### Lloyd George Says That France May Rely on Britain Should the Ferocious Brute Bite Again.

(Special United Press Wire.) Paris, April 4.—Lloyd George in an interview published in the Daily Mail, said that he would never again attempt to attack France the British would again fight with the French. He denied rumors that there were discussions between the British and French in the past conference. He said, "Basically there have been discussions, these are necessary to reach an agreement on any question, but the Anglo-French entente was never more complete than now. The British did not come to fight beside the French merely that France should enjoy comparative tranquility for a limited time. They insist that France shall have complete security for the future. The ferocious brute is tamed now, but should she ever try to bite France again the British will be there."

## FINDING WORK THE FIRST TASK

### South and Central American Trade to Be Increased for Benefit of Returning Soldiers, Says Champ Clark.

(Special United Press Wire.) Washington, April 5.—Finding work for returning soldiers and demobilized war workers should be the first task of the next congress said Champ Clark, retiring speaker of the house. Two methods of creating new jobs were advocated by Clark, saying he would push action on both when the next house convenes. They are the passage of Secretary Lane's bill appropriating \$100,000,000 to reclaim swamp and arid lands and the immediate passage of legislation increasing the trade of the United States with South and Central America. Clark's ideas will occupy an important place in the program of the house minority of the Sixty-sixth congress since he will probably be the democratic leader. On the proposition of increasing the South American trade Clark said he would probably propose a bill but had not decided what measure to embody.

### PHILIPPINE MISSION

#### ASKS SELF GOVERNMENT

(Special United Press Wire.) Washington, April 5.—The time for Philippine independence has substantially come, Secretary Baker told the Philippine mission here seeking self government. The time is very close at hand when this can be formally accomplished, Baker told the mission, describing existing relations as being merely "formalities." He added that this is the view of President Wilson also. He read a letter from the president to the mission which expressed pride in the support the Filipino has given the United States during the war. Manuel Quezon, president of the Filipino senate and head of the mission, said, granting independence, his country will prove to the world that the American is a "liberating rather than a conquering nation."

The mission, consisting of 40 native islanders, came to Secretary Baker's office where they were received by the secretary, Chief of Staff March, General McIntyre, who has been in charge of the insular bureau, and other distinguished army officers whose past services brought them in touch with Filipinos. Baker praised the co-operation of the Filipinos during the war and their restraint in abandoning, during that period, all independence agitation.

Bozeman, April 7.—After receiving the advanced age of 81 years, Mrs. Mary E. Coleman, wife of Hugh K. Coleman, died at her home near Church avenue south, where she has been an invalid for some time and had been cared for by her husband, who is 84 years old, and to whom she was married nearly 61 years ago. Arrangements for the funeral are awaiting word from Mrs. Coleman's brother, Joseph A. McElroy of Kallisell, who is expected to come for the funeral.

Deceased was born in Mansfield, O., and was a pioneer of Montana, coming to the territory in 1855. For a number of years she and her husband lived on their ranch on Bozeman creek, five miles south of the city, and after selling the ranch they moved to the home in Bozeman, where Mrs. Coleman died. One daughter was born to them, but she died when about 4 years old.
