Herron, lately the president's envoy to the bolsheviki government in Russia, says of the president in 1917: 'He is a revolutionary beyond anything his words reveal.' Five members of the president's cabinet are tainted with socialism. A vast swarm of his appointees are known to be open and vowed socialists.

PREVENTS REVOLUTIONS.

'Article 16 declares if any member of the league resorts to war in disregard of its covenants it shall of itself be deemed an act of war against all other members. This creates a condition of war without a declaration by congress. We are at once subject to invasion and our merchant shipping exposed to a hostile navy wherever found.


