**DELIVERY SERVICE FOR BUTTE PUBLIC MARKET**

As the result of conferences between Mayor Stodden and T. J. Trindon, manager of the Overseas Rapid Transfer company, regular delivery of parcels purchased at the city market to homes in all parts of the city, was inaugurated this morning. A uniform charge of 25 cents per package will be charged, according to announcements by the transfer company.

According to Mayor Stodden, he has been trying for some time to inaugurate a delivery service which would meet with the approval of persons who do not care to carry home their own purchases. With the delivery service in operation, he said, the objections of these persons to the public market has been overcome.

**THE SOUTH SEA BUBBLE.**

A book has been written on "Extraordinary Popular Delusions." "People like to be humbugged," said P. T. Barnum, of circus fame, shrewd and successful man, had he read aught a strange kink in human nature? Today is the anniversary of the bursting of the South Sea bubble, Sept. 29, 1720. It involved an incredible amount of people in utter ruin. The capital of the South Sea company was about \$168,000,000. The "bubble" arose out of Lord Treasurer Harley's desire to have taken up the large floating loan which the war of the Spanish succession (1701-13) had created. Great Britain's merchants had been granted exclusive rights of trading on the east and west coasts of South America. The privilege of carrying negroes was granted to this company, which formed extravagant ideas of the value of the South Sea trade. Speculation carried the stock to £1,000 for every £100 subscribed. Men invested blindly with ridiculous proposals to import asses, and to extract silver from sea-water. All England went mad except Walpole. Out of the mess the country looked to Walpole to deliver it. The company was dissolved, but carried on legitimate business in whale fisheries.

Washington, Sept. 29.—The senate without debate passed a resolution providing investigation of the sugar situation by the senate agricultural committee, which ordered a report as soon as possible.

The committee was ordered to report to the senate on reasons for the shortage of sugar, information regarding the price, whether unjust or exorbitant profits are made, by whom, on prospects for relief from the shortage and advise as to whether legislation should be passed.

**ST. JOHN'S IS TO HAVE A NEW ORGAN**

Man Who Sold Copper to Germany and Bought Seat in Senate, Seeks Heavenly Haven.

W. A. Clark, who once bribed his way into the United States senate, is now dickering for a seat in the angels' chorus. It was announced in the press Saturday that Clark has decided to present a magnificent electrically operated pipe organ to St. John's Episcopal church, of which Brother Chapman is rector, who addressed the striking Metal Trades last Tuesday, in the interests of the Rotary club and the employers.

The Rev. Mr. Chapman upon that occasion read to the assembled strikers a chapter out of his book, in which he proves, to his own satisfaction and the glee of old W. A. Clark, that the grievances of working men are but illusions generated in spiritual ill health and that a sweeping moral revival in America would frighten the demon bolshevism from our shores and leave the socially elect securely and comfortably perched upon the backs of the submissive.

W. A. Clark, contrary to his usual treatment of speeches delivered at 101 S. Idaho street, reported Chapman's chapter in full—verbatim—in Clark's organ, the Butte Daily Miner. He is also giving Chapman's church an organ, a magnificent new pipe organ.

It is said, however, that some of the supporters of the church are a little shy of Clark's gift and hesitate about accepting it. They remember clearly reading the court proceedings a few years ago when it was shown how the old gentleman's generosity with the Helena solons opened the door of the United States senate. And some of the good folk who worship at St. John's, though they staunchly hold that the little stone church is the vestibule of heaven, nevertheless, shrink at the thought of selling admission to a man like Clark.
