**WILLIAM MONTGOMERY,
CATTLEMAN, IS DEAD**

William Montgomery, a well-known cattleman of the Big Hole region, died last night at his home ranch near Wisdom after a brief illness. Pneumonia was the cause of death.

Mr. Montgomery was born in Ireland on Christmas day, 1863. He came to Montana in 1884 and two years later was married to Miss Cecilia Lennox of Dillon. Seven children, all of whom survive, were born Mr. Montgomery was the owner of 1,000 acres of land and several thousand head of cattle and horses. Each year he shipped from 1,000 to 1,500 head of steers to market.

**WILHELM SUES FOR USE
OF "PHIZ" IN PICTURES**

Berlin, Oct. 24.—Alleging that the unwarranted use of his likeness in moving pictures was an insult, former Kaiser Wilhelm has retained a Berlin attorney to start suit for damages against Ferdinand Bonn, a German actor. Bonn prepared the moving picture films, which were known as the "Kaiser films." They were to have been shown in Berlin on Oct. 19, but were suppressed by government order. They were shown elsewhere throughout Germany, however.

**WANTS \$17,000,000
FOR ALASKAN RAILROAD**

Washington, Oct. 24.—Additional appropriations totaling \$17,000,000 was asked of congress for the continuation of the construction of the Alaskan railroad. The request was made by Secretary Glass.

London, Oct. 24.—Earl Curzon has been appointed to succeed Arthur Balfour in the office of foreign secretary. Balfour was made president of the council to succeed Curzon.

GERMAN OPERA SANG.

New York, Oct. 24.—While hundreds of persons surged through the streets past the 300 policemen and detectives thrown around the Lexington theater, the third rendition of German opera was given last night. There was no rioting. The audience numbered not more than 500, many of whom were city detectives.

AMERICANIZATION COSTLY.

Washington, Oct. 24.—Under the terms of a new Americanization bill agreed upon yesterday by the labor committee of the senate, \$12,500,000 would be appropriated yearly for allocation among the states for the Americanization of alien residents. The states would be required to appropriate a share equal to the sum received from the government.

WARN AGAINST SUCCHARINE.

Washington, Oct. 24.—The bureau of chemistry of the agricultural department has issued a general warning against the use of saccharine as a substitute for sugar during the present sugar shortage. It is stated that saccharine is a harmful drug and its use may seriously affect the health.

OFFER KEARNE \$150,000.

New Orleans, Oct. 24.—D. J. Tator, representing a New Orleans syndicate, has offered a purse of \$150,000 for a 20-round championship bout between Jack Dempsey and Joe Beckett, English champion. The match, if the offer is accepted, will be held this winter.

**ESTHONIANS ESTABLISH
FIRST HEALTH OFFICE**

(By United Press.)
Rovaniemi, Esthonia.—(By mail.)—The republic of Esthonia, one of the half dozen political offshoots of the old Russian empire, has established a national bureau of public health—the first institution of its kind to be founded by one of the new Baltic states.

Esthonia's national health bureau came into being as the result of a series of conferences, just concluded, between Minister-President Strongmann and Lieut.-Col. Edward W. Ryan of Scranton, Pa. Colonel Ryan insisted on the establishment of the national health board as a condition precedent to the enlargement of the American relief program in Esthonian territory.
