and millions of dollar to back them in advertising and people read the ads and come to me asking that that picture be shown.

"That picture isn't the only one. Practically all the pictures are new nothing but means of propaganda for certain Wall Street interests."

To Distribute Own Pictures.

The 5,000 motion picture theater owners who have banded themselves into a single organization will distribute their own pictures to thousands of theaters in the United States and Canada, beginning Jan. 1.

Owners Can't Protest. That section of the country in which the unrest is most prominent receives pictures which will combat that sentiment, said pictures using "patriotism," loyalty and Henry Dubois to the inhabitants.

As a result of this condition, they fear it is daily becoming more difficult for an owner of a single theater or a small chain of theaters to obtain such pictures as he wants.

This effort to combat the motion picture combines is seconded by many of the most prominent actors and actresses. A number of them have already signified their intention to give their pictures to the independent exhibitors and to join them in the cooperative movement.

The principal object of the association, as announced, will be to supply independent exhibitors with a big variety of the best pictures obtainable. The organizers of this movement say that they will be rendering a big service to the people and to the motion picture industry by preventing it from becoming a mere distributor of private interests' propaganda.
