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# REVOLTS START IN INDIA AGAINST BRITISH

## BOLSHEVIKI SUCCEED IN OPENING ROAD TO INDIA, ACCORDING TO BRITISHERS

(Special United Press Wire.)  
London, Jan. 2.—The road to India is open and the bolsheviki threatens to establish communications with the entire east, General Maurice, the British military expert declared in an article in the Daily News.

Official anxiety over the Russian military situation is heightened by a Moscow dispatch in which the Russian soviet government claimed its armies entered Bokhara—the gateway to Afghanistan.

The bolsheviki emissaries have started a concentrated propaganda in the British sphere of influence to the northwest of India, according to advices received here. With sporadic revolts already under way in northern India and fighting reported between Waziri and Mahand between the tribesmen and the British soldiery, observers here believe that bolsheviki teachings in India have already begun to bear fruit and that a general revolt is imminent.

Dispatches today amplified yesterday's advices announcing a great bolsheviki victory for the red armies attacking General Denikine's anti-bolsheviki troops in south Russia. Besides capturing Ekaterinoslav and Novonokovsk, the reds claim to have taken several other towns.

General Denikine's routed armies continue their retreat toward the sea of Azov. In British military circles it is admitted that Denikine is doomed to follow the fate of General Yudenitch and Admiral Kolchak in his effort to establish an anti-bolsheviki government for Russia.

STILL RETREATING

London, Jan. 2.—Denikine's retreat continues on the whole front of approximately 600 miles, according to semi-official dispatches received here. It was admitted that the British war office considers the position of the leader of the anti-bolsheviki armies in south Russia very grave.

FORMER ARMY DOCTOR TESTIFIES FOR NEW

Los Angeles, Jan. 2.—Harry New, alleged murderer of Frieda Lessner, his sweetheart, is in the witness chair today. He testified that he does not believe that New realized the difference between right and wrong. He also asserted that he believed that New was insane at the time he shot Miss Lessner.


MAKE PLANS TO REOPEN TREATY DISCUSSIONS
