## ITALIAN MASSES HAVE SPIRIT OF REVOLT

### But Leaders of Revolutionary Groups Have Not Ability or Audacity to Cope With Present Situation.

(By the Federated Press.) New York, March 5.—Italy is in a state of revolutionary expectation. N. Giacomelli, an associate of the famous anarchist leader, Malatesta, writes to a friend in New York. "The situation in Italy is most peculiar," he said. "Every day it seems as if the revolution would break out, and then everything bursts like a soap bubble. Agitation, strikes and riots follow one another continually and produce a strange state of mind which helps to keep up abnormal social conditions and which would make any cataclysm that might occur seem natural."

"In short, we are in a period of revolutionary expectation, with the accompanying vague, general fear. My opinion is that this state of affairs will not end very soon, but will drag itself out, because among the leaders of the different revolutionary parties and organizations, there are not men of sufficient audacity and ability to meet the present historical crisis. There is more revolutionary spirit among the masses than among the leaders."

## REPLY SOUNDS DEATHKNELL OF PACT

### Such Is View in Some Quarters Regarding Wilson's Note Outlining Position of U. S. in Adriatic Dispute.

(Special United Press Wire.) London, March 5.—President Wilson, in his reply to the allied communication, reaffirms his position that the only settlement acceptable to the United States in the Adriatic dispute would be an agreement reached by direct negotiations between Italy and Yugoslavia, or a settlement as proposed December 9, according to French sources. In some quarters the reply is interpreted as the deathknell of the secret treaty of London. The note, it is understood, again makes clear that Wilson cannot recognize this agreement.

## PIONEER BUTTE PLUMBER DIES TODAY IN HOSPITAL

Stricken suddenly yesterday while apparently in excellent health, Arthur O'Brien, one of the pioneer plumbers of Butte and one of the best known men in the labor movement in the city, died early this morning in St. James hospital of hemorrhage of the brain. Mr. O'Brien had visited the Metal Mine Workers' hall at Idaho and Galena streets yesterday afternoon and had conversed with a number of workers met there. He left the hall apparently in excellent spirits and soon afterward was stricken and rushed to the hospital, where death occurred this morning.

Mr. O'Brien was born in Baltimore something over 70 years ago. He served for a time during the Civil war. In addition to his widow, he is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Driscoll and Mrs. Stack of Butte, and Mrs. Merston of Spokane; one son, Eugene O'Brien of Butte; and one brother, John O'Brien of Helena.

Swanson, the South Butte constable, formerly an alderman of Butte, who was found at 12:40 a. m. ## WILL PAY HONOR TO FIRST OVERSEA VICTIM IN BUTTE

With all military honors possible, the body of the first of Butte's overseas victims to be returned to this city will be laid to rest in a local cemetery tomorrow. It is that of Robert Noy, a member of the third draft contingent from this city, who died in an army hospital at Southampton, England, Feb. 5, 1918, as the result of an illness contracted while en route across the Atlantic for the firing lines in France.

Young Noy was a resident of Centerville. In addition to his mother and father who reside in Michigan, he is survived by two brothers in Centerville, David and Thomas Noy. Members of the American Legion will assemble tomorrow afternoon at 1:15 o'clock in preparation for the services which will be held at Richard's undertaking parlors. The body is expected to arrive in Butte tonight.
